Candidate sees restructured IFC as a key to greater student input

The Incidental Fee Committee's decision to defund the Federalist Society during the Student Bar Association's budget hearing last winter strongly influenced Dan Perlow's decision to run for a one-year position on the IFC.

As a second-year law student, Perlow was "appalled and dumbfounded" at the lack of understanding displayed by current IFC members and would like to see a restructuring of the IFC.

According to Perlow, students from individual schools should elect their own representatives to the IFC.

Although he admits that this restructuring method may be a "radical idea," he supports this statement by claiming that if this change were placed into effect, there would be increased student representation on the committee.

It also would increase stu-

dent interest and involvement in the budgetary process, he says.

In this way, "it would be the students, not special interest groups, who elect the IFC," said Perlow, who was endorsed by Amazon Community Tenants.

He also said he would like to have student groups held more

accountable for the funds allocated to them.

"If they ask for an increase in funding, they should be able to justify it," he said.

In order to determine a group's need for a budgetary increase, Perlow believes that groups should submit a more detailed breakdown of their budget requests.

He also said that student groups should be held more accountable for the funds spent in individual line items.

Perlow's leadership experience includes working as a law clerk at American Savings in California last summer.

In addition, in 1985-86 he was a member of the Graduate Teaching Fellows Federation and is a current member of the Student Bar Association.

He also worked in the Oregon Legislature in 1986-87 before entering law school in the fall of 1987.

Neely seeks greater minority group representation in IFC

Elizabeth Neely wants to see increased student representation and involvement in the Incidental Fee Committee next year.

Neely, a graduate student in health care administration running for the IFC one-year seat, said that some students are alienated from the student government process.

These include graduate students, minorities and women.

To help balance these discrepancies, Neely said that if elected, she would work to ensure representation and involvement of these groups in student government.

"Women and minorities are the people traditionally left out of group participation," Neely said. "As an active member of the IFC, it would be my objective to make sure that these groups are not discriminated against."

In addition, she would work with student groups and com-

mittee members to "undo racism."

Although committee members may not be able to conduct anti-racism workshops, the committee does have the power to monitor groups to ensure that discrimination does not occur, she said.

Neely feels her experience in CISCAP during her undergrad-

uate years at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, and work in the Eugene Women, Infants, and Children Support Food Program underscores her ability to "take the initiative."

Her understanding of oppression she feels resulted from her visit to Costa Rica and Nicaragua in 1985-86.

Prior to her graduation from Lewis and Clark last spring, she coordinated numerous campus programs for CISCAP, the American Cancer Society and the American Red Cross.
