

Sale says science won't save Earth

Disasters such as global warming, the hole in the ozone layer and the extinction of species cannot be repaired by "technofix," Kirkpatrick Sale said Thursday.

Technofix is society's "reli-

ciety). *Human Scale and Dwellers in the Land: Bioregional Vision.*

Sale, speaking as part of the Survival Center's Earthweek '89 Celebration, told the crowd that humanity faces an ecological crisis far worse than we may realize. In fact, Sale said the earth is not approaching a

"The vision ignores all barriers of rich-poor, Democrat-Republican and black-white," he said.

Sale said the four components of Bioregionalism include a "re-enchantment of the world," "knowing place," "listening to the voices of the earth" and "biocentrism."

A "re-enchantment of the world" means moving ourselves away from the "religion of science" that teaches that the earth is lifeless, Sale said. "We have to come to see the earth as holy."

The second component, "knowing place," is learning to know home. Sale said that the earth itself is unknowable but we can know our own region, and added humans must understand the absolute limits the land can hold.

The third part of Bioregionalism is "listening to the voices of the earth" to understand the laws of nature. "Our mother is not society but nature, and nature knows best. Everything is connected," he said.

Finally, biocentrism is the ability of humans to live in harmony with other species.

Sale said there are 125 bioregional groups in the country, and is positive the movement will work because it is an appropriate answer for the present. Sale said that the new ecological movement may be unprecedented, "but the crisis is unprecedented."

Student Senate tables diversity, IFC motions

The Student Senate tabled two motions relating to ASUO politics brought by Senator Pieter Paulson on Thursday night.

The first motion dealt with the lack of diversity in the ASUO under any administration and the lack of Senate power in regards to confirming ASUO executive appointments, which Paulson said he believes are current-

ly composed almost entirely of campaign workers from the presidential ticket.

"Everytime someone has won they have hired their friends. The Student Senate has no power to confirm people," Paulson said.

Senate Chair Eric Grimes said the Student Senate should be based as closely as possible on the U.S. Government which does have the power to confirm cabinet appointments.

"The ASUO executive should be opened up to as many people who are not already involved in government," Paulson said.

The motion was tabled at the advice of Senator Patrick Johnston because he said the Senate should first look at constructive ways to communicate with the new administration to involve as many people as possible in ASUO government.

"Upon the election of the new president and vice-president we will have them come to the Senate," Grimes said.

Paulson's other motion called for student groups who receive IFC funding to stop endorsing candidates for ASUO office.

"If you receive IFC funds ... then you have no right to endorse candidates," Paulson said.

The Student Senate, which does receive IFC money, can not endorse candidates.

This motion was tabled so the Senate could find out more about the present endorsement methods and so that the motion itself could be made more presentable.

In other business the Senate questioned current EMU Board member Joseph Sebanakitta about his confirmation to the ASUO Constitution Court before adding their formal acceptance.

Hovet memorial service this weekend

A memorial service — or more accurately, a celebration of life — for Professor Thomas Hovet Jr. will be held Sunday, April 23, in the EMU Ballroom at 2 p.m.

At Hovet's request, a New Orleans Dixieland band will perform at the the service. The Black Swan Classical Jazz Band will play "When the Saints Go Marching In" in memory of Hovet.

"It's a celebration of life — it's going to be very informal dealing with the legacy of very beloved teacher," said Arthur Hanhardt, head of the political science department and a close

friend of Hovet's.

Hovet, a political science professor, author of more than 10 books and one who was listed in the 1980-81 "Who's Who in the World," died March 28 at his home of natural causes.

Described as "one of the most well-liked professors on campus," Hovet was with the University's political science department for 24 years.

Hovet is survived by his wife Erica and his two daughters, Heather and Lisa. The family requests donations be sent in care of the Knight Library, particularly the documents section.
