Candidate clarifies election complaint intent

Former ASUO presidential and vice-presidential candidates Tim Hughes and Maureen Kirk never intended to challenge the April 20 election results, Kirk said Friday.

Kirk said the possibility of negative backlash for other ASUO candidates endorsed by Students for a Progressive Agenda, of which Hughes and Kirk are members, led SPA to choose not to ask that the election results be invalidated.

"It was not an easy decision because we felt there were injustices in the election," Kirk said.

The ASUO Executive primaries sparked controversy when Hughes and Kirk filed

charges to the Constitution Court alleging coercion tactics were used within the University's fraternity and sorority system to force people to vote.

In their complaint Hughes and Kirk charged that the Gamma Phi Beta, Delta Gamma, Pi Beta Phi and Sigma Chi houses withheld food from members, or awarded dessert or seniority points as incentives for voting.

These charges were dismissed by the ASUO Constitution Court because of insufficient evidence.

Based on the lack of evidence and the responses Greek leaders made that such allegations were false, Kirk said the court made the right ruling.

"We wanted the court to clarify whether the section (2.4) of the election rules applied to fraternities and sororities regarding desserts or dinners and points," Kirk said.

Things were running smoothly until the actual election, Kirk said. She blames the prevalent homophobic attitudes on campus as well as the tactics of the Greek system for the Hughes/Kirk loss.

Panhellenic Council president Dandy Kromminga agrees it is important to get rules clarified. "There are a lot of bitter feelings about this election, and I think everyone feels bad about," she said.

"Tim and Maureen are valuable leaders, and I hope they will actively support the Clark/Wyckoff administration."

Officials delay plans for railroad project

Eugene parks officials decided to postpone indefinitely plans for a scale-model railroad project in Alton Baker Park, saying the park's future plans are not settled and the train would place further demands on the land.

Railroad plans will be delayed at least three months to allow for further evaluation of Lane County's plans for a public golf course and a possible WISTEC museum complex expansion, said Ed Smith, executive director of the city's parks, recreation and cultural services department.

"We still like the concept of the railroad, but we need to wait out these other projects," Smith said.

But he said there are many things that need to be resolved before putting further demands on the eastern portion of the park where the railroad was to be built.

In addition to uncertainty with the museum and golf

course plans, opposition by runners who use Pre's Trail also gave reason for postponement, Smith said.

The city has withdrawn a greenway conditional use permit from consideration at a May 10 public hearing.

Ray Robinson, who spearheaded efforts to get the Emerald Empire Railroad's initial 2-mile loop in the park, said he is giving up on his attempt to build a railroad anywhere in Eugene.

Robinson envisioned small railroad cars running around the WISTEC museum and through the adjacent site of the proposed Lane County museum.

Robinson had expected to use the first two miles as a trial to see if the Eugene community would want to expand the railroad through the undeveloped eastern portion of the park and eventually develop a full transportation system throughout the Eugene-Springfield area.

Surprised by the parks department decision, Robinson said he is disappointed that a small group of Eugene runners could have power to influence the railroad's development.

"The main and only opposition had been the Pre's Trail people," he said.
