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"The trend is turning to a mandatory health insurance program," Clark said. "It's the responsibility of the ASUO to provide an adequate health insurance program."

They will also concentrate on keeping student fees down, as tuition will rise almost 9 percent over the next two years. Clark said that a "well-balanced Incidental Fee Committee" and active lobbying on the state and national level will help put pressure on legislators to hold fees to minimum levels.

In addition, they said they will work with the State Board of Higher Education and through Oregon Student Lobby to advocate funding for student programs and child care in the midst of recent wide-spread budget cuts.

Clark, Wyckoff and the new ASUO staff will be on hand today in the EMU to distribute information and form letters concerning the state budget cuts to University programs and services.

They are also calling for an administrative needs assessment for student parents to determine appropriate levels of child care funding and facilities.

Reacting to recent confrontations between Eugene police and off-campus student parties, Clark said he will work with the Eugene City Council and the police next year to ease tensions between the police and students.

"We need to get students involved in the community and bring the community into the

University community and build some kind of rapport between them," Clark said.

Wyckoff said the new administration will also strive to increase the power and input of the Student Senate next year, a group he said is a valuable legislative resource.

"Students can get involved in the Senate at a low level of commitment," Wyckoff said. "We need to let them feel more ownership of student government."

The Executive team will also seek to establish a strong relationship with incoming University President Myles Brand, a person they feel has pro-active ideals similar to their own.

"He's a very open person and the kind who won't just sit there in Johnson Hall," Wyckoff said.

They said they will use the resources of the ASUO to back student groups in their funding and establishment to create an AIDS policy, organize student parents and create a coalition of representatives from various ethnic student unions to "recognize the needs of all student of color," Clark said.

"Student groups need to realize they can work with us and not outside us to attain their goals," Wyckoff said.

"They need to understand that we're here for them and we can facilitate each other," Clark said.

"We're going to teach people. We're going to get out there and use our feet and get input," Clark said.

In addition, the president said the new administration is committed to ending verbal and physical attacks on people of color, gays and lesbians through education and workshops.

"We are a community divided, and each day we polarize ourselves with the ignorance and intolerance that we should face and do battle against," Clark said.

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
