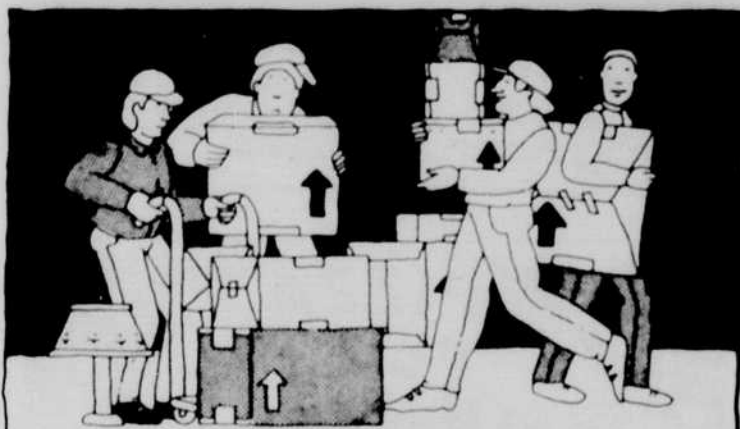




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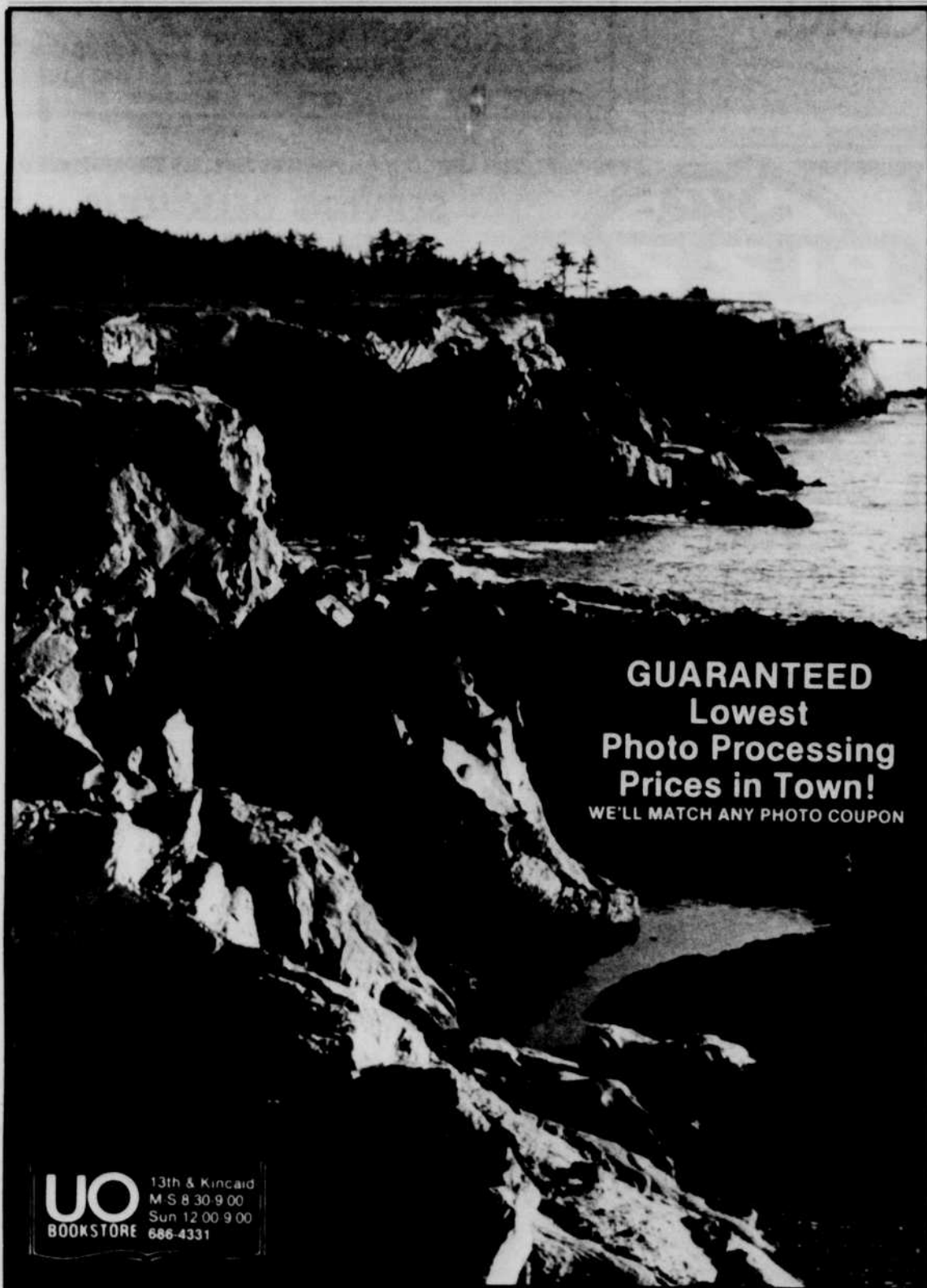


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Eugene newspaper named in suit

The *Register-Guard*, Eugene's largest newspaper, has been slapped with an unfair labor practice complaint by the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB).

Acting on a charge filed on June 9 by the Eugene Newspaper Guild, the union, which represents 130 newsroom, circulation, business office, advertising, personnel, and data processing workers at the *Register-Guard*, the NLRB has scheduled a hearing for Oct. 17 to determine whether the newspaper has violated its obligation under federal labor law to bargain in good faith with the Guild.

The original charge was filed by the Guild in response to a unilateral change in the wage levels of workers in twelve job classifications made by the *Register-Guard*.

In the subsequent NLRB Complaint, the federal board stated that "on or about April 24,

1989" the newspaper "imposed changes in wages ... without having afforded the Union an adequate opportunity to negotiate and bargain" over the changes.

The changes were made almost one year after the paper presented its final offer to the Guild in collective bargaining negotiations for a new contract. Under Federal labor law, employers are legally obligated to bargain with unions whenever a change in wages, hours, or working conditions is at issue.

In spite of this obligation, the *Register-Guard* has consistently refused to bargain over the unilateral wage change, even though the Guild requested such talks on May 16.

Guild member Mike Stahlberg said workers at the *Register-Guard*, who have been working without a contract since Aug. 31, 1988, are frustrated by the treatment they have received at the hands of the newspaper.

Despite their frustration, Guild members are eager to see the NLRB take action.

Fulbright recipients announced

Seven University students have been awarded student Fulbright Awards to study in other countries for the 1989-90 academic year.

Almost 60 students have been named as Fulbright scholars since 1980, said Thomas Mills, director of the University Office of International Services. The winners of the awards are: Kendal Broadie of Ashland; Kit

Andrews, a graduate student in comparative literature, will use his grant to study in West Germany. Andrews' grant is funded by the Germanistic Society of America.

Rizzo, a graduate student in modern history, will study in France.

Vang, graduate student in geography, will research law and forestry in Papua, New Guinea.

Stasack will use his grant, funded by the French government teaching assistantship program, to teach at a lycee, a public secondary school that prepares students for university studies. Stasack is a graduate student in secondary education.

Leimar is a grad student in anthropology, and will study in

Thailand.

Ahlstrom is a 1982 graduate in music who will use his Annette Kade Fellowship to study the organ in France.

Broadie, a graduate student in biology, was offered his Fulbright grant to study in the United Kingdom.

Six students, who may receive grants if other students are unable to accept them, have been chosen as alternates for Fulbright awards.

The alternates are Eric Wegner of Bend, an undeclared graduate student; three Eugene residents; Carla Burnside and Linda Reed, doctoral degree students in anthropology; and Robin Schaefer, a senior international studies major; Molly Widmer of Medford, a masters degree student in anthropology; and Nancy Forrest of Washington, Pa., a masters degree student in international studies.
