

Bradshaw receives big scholarships

Pilar Bradshaw, a University student from Eugene, will receive two major scholarships totaling \$19,000.

The first award is a two-year, \$14,000 Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship for Excellence in Science and Mathematics, one of only 25 awards given annually to juniors by the Barry M. Goldwater Foundation in a national competition.

The second is a \$5,000 University Scholarship donated in the name of retired University chemistry professor Richard Noyes, a National Academy of Sciences member since 1977 and one of the world's leading physical chemists in the area of chemical kinetics.

Bradshaw, a graduate of South Eugene High School, recently completed her junior year in a five-year program of undergraduate studies. She is majoring in chemistry and music.

Merit Scholar, Bradshaw is also a University Presidential Scholar, an Academic All-American and a Dean's Scholar in the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, she was awarded the Outstanding Freshman Chemistry Student Award by the chemistry department.

Bradshaw plans to attend medical school and pursue a career in biochemical research, focusing on metabolic disorders. At the same time, Bradshaw, a violinist, said she intends to maintain her interests in performing orchestral and solo music.

Grad scholarships offer chance to study in Japan

University students interested in pursuing post-graduate research studies in the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences at a Japanese university may now apply for 18-month or two-year scholarships.

The scholarships are being offered by the Ministry of Education in Japan and are available to U.S. citizens who are university or college graduates and will be under the age of 35 as of April 1, 1990.

Applicants must be willing to study the Japanese language, as all classes will be taught in Japanese.

The two-year scholarships will run from April, 1990 to March, 1992 and the 18-month program will run from October, 1990 to March, 1992. Both of these tenure periods include six months of study of the Japanese language.

The scholarships will include airfare to and from Japan, tuition, fees and a monthly stipend of approximately \$1,300 a month.

There are various forms of housing available to foreign students including foreign student houses and residence halls for overseas students.

Those wishing to enter the master's or doctor's degree program need to have studied for at least six months as non-degree research students and to pass an entrance exam given by the university they wish to attend.
