Onside kick. They're not supposed to work. It worked. Couple of plays. Brian Hopkins bangs home a 37-yard field goal with no time on the clock.


There went the ball game.

Losing might even help the team. Coming up this Saturday is a home game against Arizona. No over-dramatization intended, but the Arizona game will probably be the key to the season.


Win this one and the Ducks are right back in the Rose Bowl hunt, lose it and expect Oregon to slip into their familiar routine of .500 mediocrity.
