

# University appoints top officials

The University has appointed top level officials in the graduate school and provost's office.

Kenneth Ramsing becomes dean of the graduate school for 1989-90, effective immediately. He has been acting dean since July 1987.

A professor of decision sciences in the College of Business Administration, Ramsing joined that faculty in 1965. He holds a bachelor's degree from Oregon State University and a master of business administration and doctoral degrees from the University.

"President Myles Brand and I are grateful to Ken for his willingness to continue providing the perspective, experience and judgment the University needs as we plan for future graduate and professional education," said Norman Wessells, University provost and vice president for academic affairs.

Gerald Kissler assumes the new post of senior vice provost for planning and resources on Nov. 1. Kissler currently is vice

provost for planning and academic program development at the University of California, Los Angeles.

"Kissler's selection resulted from a national search that attracted a large number of extremely talented candidates," Wessells said. "During his 16 years at UCLA, he was exceptionally successful in providing

leadership that resulted in the development of new interdisciplinary programs and in attracting grant money from foundations and federal agencies."

A native of the Pacific Northwest, Kissler earned a doctoral degree in experimental psychology from Washington State University in 1973.

ceeded the limit. This method of proving the number of kills also is being questioned by conservationists. Their concern comes from the possibility that hunters will not claim the true amount of kills.

The United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service now will handle the ap-

peal. It has 10 days to respond. The department has two choices: It may choose to fulfill CCW's desire and recall the permit until further research can be conducted as to the amount of cougars exist in the forests, or it may choose to ignore the appeal, which will undoubtedly prompt further legal action on the part of CCW.

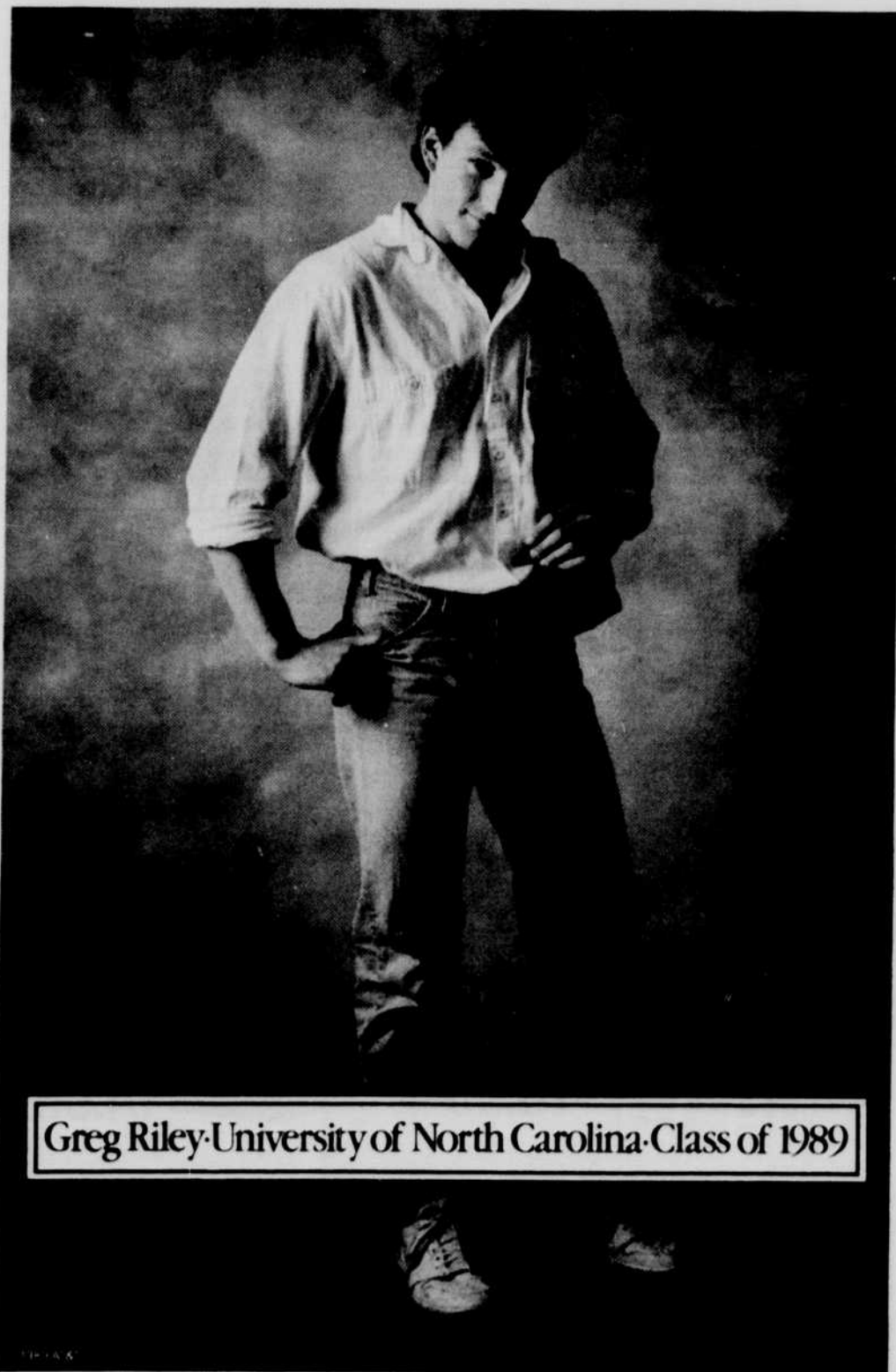
