# Rape investigation nets suspect

Allegations of a rape earlier this month at a University fraternity prompted a Eugene Police Department investigation that has led to a suspect in the case.

The name of the suspect is being withheld.

"At this point, (the investigation) will take at least another month," said Detective Jim Michaud of the Eugene Police Department.

The rape allegedly happened Sept. 9 at Theta Chi house, 1125 E. 19th Ave., and was reported the morning of Sept. 10.

"It's probably one of those cases that will go to the grand jury," said Captain Tim Birr, public information officer for the Eugene Department of Public Safety.

The woman filing the report is 18 years old and is not a member of a sorority, said Officer Susie Hunter of the University's Office of Public Safety. Michaud released minimal information about the case and refused to state the age of the suspect

The reported rape occurred during a party at Theta Chi when the suspect and woman, who had just met, went to a separate room in the house, Birr said.

According to Birr, the woman claimed that after entering the room, the suspect shut the door, banged her head several times against a wall and raped her.

The woman left the house and returned home. A friend later took her to a hospital.

Theta Chi President Neal McLaughlin denied a party took place the night of the alleged rape and said no one was authorized to be in the house.

Hunter and Michaud both said the suspect is a member of the fraternity, but McLaughlin said the suspect is not and never was a Theta Chi member.

"(The suspect) is not affiliated with the house," McLaughlin said. "As far as we're concerned (the incident) is distant from the house."


