Brand said the University needs to get the message out that higher education is an important priority to the academic and economic health of the state.

"The most important thing (legislators) could do is to create an environment that attracts and retains the best among Oregon students because those students ... will stay in-state and will contribute to the state," he said

At PSU, administrators cut back the number of non-admitted students taking classes and eliminated some lecture sections, which has many students and community members upset, said Roger Edgington, PSU interim president. To make up for the lack of state funds, the University will step up its efforts to attract private donations and grants, Brand said.

However, even an increase in outside revenue will not fill the gap created by the cut in state funding, he said.

"We have until the middle of the next decade to solve the problem or not," Brand said. "If we don't start soon and begin to make progress, it will be too late."

More than a third of the faculty is expected to retire within the next 10 years, and the University needs to have adequate funding to recruit and retain top professors to fill vacancies. he said

Even curbs on enrollment have not reduced class sizes or the workloads of already overworked faculty, which has prompted PSU to hire 18 additional staff members. Edgington said.

At OSU, where enrollment increased by 300 to 400 students and the faculty is being decreased by six to eight positions, the results of budget cuts are being felt mainly by professors, Spanier said.

"We've got to find a way to bring enrollment under control," Spanier said. "We really don't have enough faculty to teach the way we would like to teach students."
