

night," Howard said. "Next time we ask you to be here, show up with the numbers that will send the University a message."

Howard also told GTFs the next step toward reaching a solution with the University is fact finding. "Fact finding comes down to who can lie most effectively," Howard said.

Lawrence Musgrove, a GTF in the English department spoke after Howard. Musgrove thanked the federation for all the work it is doing for the GTFs.

"The union is asking for better answers than the ones they are getting from the University," Musgrove said.

Former GTFF leader Chuck Hunt spoke next. Hunt pointed out GTFs have never received a salary that was equal to the inflation rate. Hunt also told the audience that the GTFF is dealing with an administration that conducts itself with arrogant elitism.

"I'd like to believe that the president doesn't

believe in elitism rather than mansions," Hunt said.

After Hunt, Kurt Wilcox of the Lane County Labor Council spoke. Wilcox talked about the issue of health care.

"It is a terrible irony that an organization is willing to train people to teach, yet it won't pay for their health care," Wilcox said. "GTFs need to come into the class room and not be distracted by things at home."

The last speaker of the afternoon was University associate professor and State Representative Karl Hosticka (D-Eugene). Hosticka said it is impossible to achieve excellence by squeezing your employees and told the union that if they are not organized they can't exist.

The rally ended with GTFs, pickets in hand, marching around the University's administration building. The GTFF will have to wait 30 days after fact finding before going on strike.


