Benefactor for business school will speak at dedication today

A California developer who has donated \$1 million to create four professorships in the new Charles H. Lundquist Center for Business Development will speak today in a dedication ceremony.

The money, donated by California developer Charles Lundquist, will be matched by the Oregon State System of Higher Education's new Endowment for Excellence Program.

The dedication ceremony, which is open to the public, is at 2:30 p.m. in Room 128 of the Chiles Business Center. James Reinmuth, dean of the University's College of Business Administration, and University President Myles Brand will open the ceremony.

Richard Hensley, president of the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, is the featured guest. He will speak on "Challenges for Tomorrow's Entrepreneurs."

Reinmuth said the long-range goal of the center is to create an understanding of entrepreneurship in business activity. The center will develop teaching materials and establish a body of research to examine innovative business practices.

The University announced its first match Sept. 19 for the En-

dowment for Excellence Program. Carolyn Chambers of Eugene gave the \$1 million gift. The Chambers endowment will create an academic chair in the College of Business Administration and two distinguished professorships in the School of Journalism.

The Oregon Legislature approved a \$1.2 million fund this year that matches the earnings on qualifying private endowments given to the University and Oregon State University foundations.

The endowments are earmarked for the purpose of establishing distinguished faculty positions. The endowment program is subject to final approval by the Oregon State Board of Higher Education at its October meeting.

One million dollars is required to endow an academic chair and \$500,000 is needed to endow a distinguished professorship. The main purpose of endowments created under the matching program is to enhance existing positions with salary supplements, research funds and increased library holdings.

Providing endowments for faculty chairs and professorships is one of the goals of The

Campaign for Oregon, the University's \$60 million capital fund drive. University officials hope to have \$7.25 million in named endowed academic positions by the campaign's end in 1992.

The campaign is ahead of its planned schedule with more than \$38 million in pledges and gifts received since it was launched in May 1988. The campaign is coordinated by the University Foundation, an independent corporation organized to solicit and manage gifts for the University.

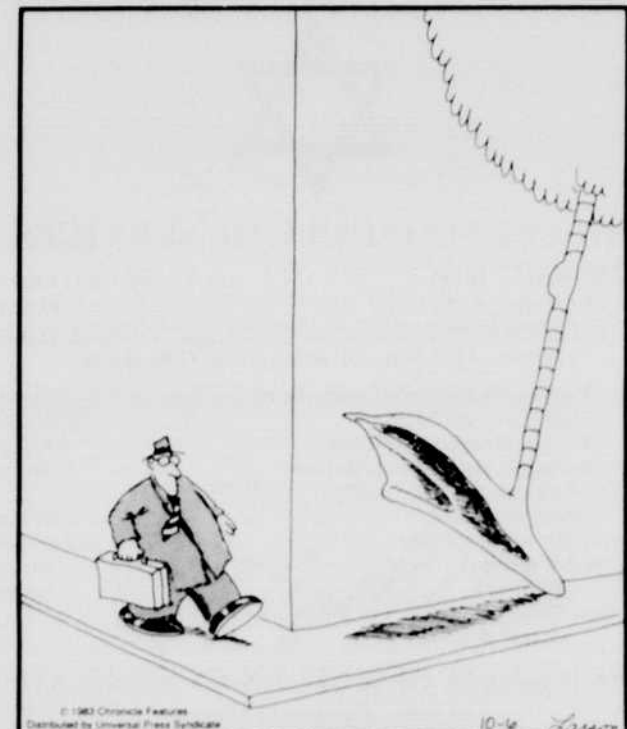
