

# Frohnmayer to run for governor

## Education among priorities

State Attorney General David Frohnmayer, a Eugene Republican and former professor at the University law school, will run for governor in the 1990 election, he announced Tuesday in Eugene.

About 80 supporters cheered, waved signs, and chanted "We want Dave" at the Eugene-Springfield Red Lion Inn, where Frohnmayer declared his candidacy accompanied by his wife and five children.

Frohnmayer, 49, kicked off his campaign Tuesday morning in Medford, where he grew up, before flying to Eugene. Frohnmayer was scheduled to announce his candidacy at stops in Salem and Portland Tuesday afternoon.

"I return today to my family home with enthusiasm and with a great sense of personal responsibility," Frohnmayer

said. "I have long desired to to serve the state as governor and to serve the people of this state who have given so much to me and my family."

The state is suffering from a lack of leadership, Frohnmayer said, and although he bears no animosity toward Gov. Neil Goldschmidt, Frohnmayer said Goldschmidt has not dealt effectively with several crucial state issues during his three years in office.

Frohnmayer criticized Goldschmidt's performance in areas such as funding for public education, fighting drug abuse and crime, and spending government revenues.

Higher education is not a priority in the Goldschmidt administration, but it would be if he were elected, Frohnmayer said.

"In the last three prosperous years, has our state's governor served the higher education community so that our bright-

est students and our renowned faculties will give us the resources of their minds, their energies and their imaginations for the 21st century? Sadly the answer is 'no,'" Frohnmayer said.

"If it (higher education) were a priority, it would be reflected in the executive budget," Frohnmayer said in a question and answer session after his announcement, adding that using funds from video poker to pay for faculty salary increases is not his idea of stable funding for education, Frohnmayer said.

Abortion will remain legal with no new restrictions if he is elected, Frohnmayer said.

"The law ought to leave
