Oregon spikers stomp Trojans

The Oregon volleyball team accomplished what it wanted to this weekend by coming out of Los Angeles with at least one

win.

The Ducks beat ninth-ranked USC Friday night for their biggest upset of the year and then lost to No. 2 UCLA Saturday to come away with a split on the road.

Oregon swept the Trojans in three straight games to take the match 17-15, 15-13, 15-9.

The match was important for

the Ducks because it could give them an edge for postseason seedings. The Ducks are currently sixth in Region 8 and looking to move up at least a notch.

"This victory put us in a good position to really help ourselves in the conference and for the NCAA tournament," Oregon coach Gerry Gregory said.

Once again, senior outside hitter Michele Krebsbach led the Ducks as she put down 10 kills and had nine digs defensively. Sophomore middle blocker Dawnn Charroin added eight kills while her classmate and outside hitter Julie Jeffery punched over seven.

Defensively, senior outside hitter Melissa Terzian provided eight digs while Stephanie Snyder, Charroin and Jeffery contributed six each. Snyder led in assists with 25.

USC was led by senior outside hitter Jill Daniels and junior middle blocker Megan McCallister who each had 10 kills.

As a team, statistics weren't

that impressive for Oregon. The Ducks had a .023 kill percentage off 13 kills and 12 errors in 43 attempts in game one. Game two improved slightly as the team dropped its error number to nine for a .103 kill ratio. The third game worsened as the Ducks had one more error than kill for a negative .040 mark.

The win Friday night put Oregon in fourth place in the Pacific-10 Conference, a half game ahead of the Trojans. But the Ducks would enjoy their stint at fourth for only a day.

USC defeated Oregon State Saturday night and Oregon lost to UCLA putting the Ducks back into fifth place a half game behind USC.

Saturday night's match with UCLA was a humbling one for Oregon as the Bruins sent the Ducks to a quick defeat in three straight games 6-15, 4-15, 7-15.

UCLA dominated the entire match, having a team kill percentage of .500 in the third and final game and managing a .333 kill ratio in game two.

Junior outside hitter Samantha Shaver came off the bench for the Bruins to put away 11 kills and counter the Ducks' efforts with seven digs. Outside hitter Natalie Williams added 10 kills for the Bruins.

The Ducks never had time to accumulate impressive stats, but they were once again led by Krebsbach with seven kills. Snyder and sophomore middle blocker Mindee Adams contributed six digs apiece.

The Ducks were outblocked by the Bruins 23-12 and could manage only a .158 kill ratio to UCLA's .355 mark.

"We ran into a buzzsaw and didn't play well at all," Gregory said. "This is the first time I can think of when we didn't play well at all. There was no letdown after USC, but this group of kids has never played well at UCLA."

The Bruins are undefeated in the Pac-10 this year at 17-0 and have their final match at USC Tuesday night to possibly go undefeated in the conference for the second year in a row.

Besides Musgrave's touchdown pass marks, another individual school record and a team record were set in the game.

Terry Obee caught two passes for 37 yards and is now Oregon's all-time career receiving yardage leader with 2,075 yards, breaking the pass reception yardage record held by Lew Barnes with 2,048 yards.

The Ducks' 38 points also gave them 322 points for the season, breaking the old school record of 285 set in 1970.
