## Kiefer heads elementary council

The National Council of Teachers of Eng lish elected Barbara Kiefer chairwomen of its elementary section. Keifer is currently an as-
sistant professor at the University's school of education.
The NCTE is a professional organization of english teachers with 66,000 members in the United States. Canada and other English speaking countries, said Diane Allen of the NCTE public information office.
"The goal of the NCTE is continuous professional growth for teachers throughout their professional careers." Allen said
Keifer served as a member of the NCTE elementary section steering committee, which has 11,000 members, before being elected as chairwoman of the elementary section.
She first became involved with the NCTE in 1980 while a graduate student at Ohio State since 1988.
-I became involved with the NCTE because it is the primary organization for those of us in the field of teaching language arts and literature," Kiefer said
"Those at the University level need to be involved with a professional organization.' she said. "It helps them stay current with the latest research and theory and is a place to meet colleagues.

Her duties as chairwoman will include planning the elementary section convention program, reviewing proposals for sympo-
siums, initiating publications and formulating statements of policy regarding english teach ing and related matters
said. "It goes beyond professional duties relat-
ed to teaching. "
Originally. Kiefer wanted to teach art, but
difficulties in finding a job eventually led her
to be an elementary school instructor, she
said. "The two things that I like best are read-
ing and art." Kiefer said. "When I was an ele-
mentary teacher reading was an absolutely pri-
mary concern.
"If kids can't read then nothing falls into
place." kiefer said. "I saw love of literature as
prime motivator of children to learn to
read."
Kiefer said she decided to return to school
at Ohio State to focus on language. literature
and reading. Her research involved children's
responses to picture books.
Kiefer said she has several concerns about
current methods of teaching at the elementary
school level that she hopes to address when
she officially takes office at the 7gth Annual
NCTE Convention in Baltimore Nov. $17-22$.
The first of these concerns is that children
are not choosing to read. Keifer said.
"Many children learn how to read, but
they are not doing it." kiefer said. "This is be-
cause of an influence by television on children
and the fact that children are scheduled into
other activities that take away from books."
Another area Kiefer said she has problems
with is standardized testing, which kiefer said
has to be quantifiable.
"By being multiple choice, standardized
tests lead away from developing children's
ability to ask questions and consider possible
answers and choices not just on a test, but in
life." Kiefer said.


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
