War game, carried for 16 yards and a first down at the Beaver 41. Musgrave hit tight end Joe Meerten for 11 yards and another first down at Oregon State's 30.

A five-yard offside penalty to Oregon State and an 11-yard run by Loville gave the Ducks a first down at Oregon State's 14.

After Oregon State linebacker Todd Sahlfeld sacked Musgrave for a three-yard loss, Musgrave combined with Loville on a heart-stopping play that led to the Ducks' last touchdown.

Musgrave rolled right on the play only to find his receivers covered. He then turned and threw across the field to Loville for a 15-yard gain and a first-and-goal at the Oregon State 2.

Loville scored on the next play and Gregg McCallum's extra point gave Oregon a nine-point cushion at 30-21.

"That was a little scary," Oregon coach Rich Brooks said. "I'm glad Loville came back on it because the Oregon State defensive back was closing on it."

"That kind of throw clear across the field, you see that thing hanging in the air and you think it might be going the other way," he said.

Loville supported Musgrave's decision on the play.

"Bill took some chances, but you have to take chances to come up with the big plays," Loville said. "The pass worked out great because Bill was aware of where I was and where the defensive guy was and got it to me."

On the Beavers' next possession, Oregon linebacker Peter Brantley sacked Schichtle on first down, free safety Derek Horton broke up Schichtle's pass to Ross, and linebacker Andy Conner sacked Schichtle again to force a fumble and Beaver punt on fourth down.

The teams then exchanged unsuccessful possessions to close out the game and the Beavers were Civil War losers for the thirteenth time in the last 15 years.

Oregon has struggled at times this year trying to hold leads, but Brooks was pleased with the character the Ducks showed in beating the Beavers to finish 7-4.

"I was pleased that our team responded when they had to at the end and took the ball down the field," Brooks said. "Maybe we got a little self-satisfied at the half. We came out a little unproductive and Oregon State took the fight to us and we struggled."

The Ducks grabbed an early 3-0 lead after Eric Castle

stripped Hughely of the ball on the opening kickoff. Rory Dairy recovered the fumble at the Oregon State 25, but the Ducks had to settle for the field goal when the Beaver defense held.

Oregon increased its lead to 10-0 on its second possession by driving 95 yards in 12 plays, the last a four-yard touchdown run by Loville.

Oregon State punter Mark Bennet had pinned the Ducks at their own five-yard line with a 27-yard kick from the Oregon 32.

The Ducks scored two second-quarter field goals for the 16-0 halftime margin. Brooks said the margin should have been bigger.

"I thought we should have had more points at the half," he said. "I was really disappointed after the fumble on the opening kickoff, when we go three downs and have to settle for a field goal."

The Ducks also had an apparent touchdown called back when the officials flagged Oregon for an illegal block on Derek Horton's interception return late in the second quarter.

Horton picked off a Schichtle pass in Oregon territory and ran it into the Oregon State end zone, but the penalty brought the ball back to the Oregon 25.

After the game, Brooks and several Oregon players gave the Beavers their due for their play against the favored Ducks:

"Oregon State kept hanging in there and kept coming after us," Brooks said. "I've got to congratulate coach Kragthorpe for a job well done by his football team and his football program."


Senior fullback Latin Berry, who had made some less-than-kind comments about the Beavers' post-game celebration after last year's 21-10 Civil War win in Corvallis, grudgingly paid the Beavers respect.

"I have to give them a lot of respect because they got down but never quit," Berry said. "As much as it kills me to say it, I have to take my hat off to them."

Senior nose tackle David Cusano, another of 21 Oregon seniors who played their final game for Oregon, said kind things about the Beavers, but left no doubt who he thought was the better team.

"I have to give them credit," Cusano said. "They're a very good football team ... a well coached team."

"But I think it's obvious we're a better football team and I think we wanted it more as well."
