ed, to commit civil disobedience against the policies of the U.S. government."

Former University student Jim Guthrie was one of the last three protesters to be arrested. Guthrie was later cited for the same offense as the other protesters and released.

"I was there to make as strong a statement as I could to my government," he said. "They can't do that in my name."

Guthrie said he felt the community was supportive of their protesting, from the local police, to federal employees, to drivers of cars passing by, to Congressman DeFazio. This leads him to note that the foreign policy adopted by the federal government doesn't represent this community, he said.

In addition, other University students charged were Brian Hoop, Nicolas Van Aelstyn, Andrew Wulfers, Frank Falch, Erin Fristad, Enrique Arias, Matthew Benetsch, Andrew

Wynne, Brian Brunius, Phillip Zerbo, Jeni Diehnel, Tom Higbey, Kevin O'Brien, Marcus Scott, Bob Holt and Daniel Layden.

However, not all protesters were there to get arrested. Many said they were there to show their support for the protest.

"We stand in solidarity with everybody in El Salvador," said Tricia Coreson, a University student and the University Democrats Outreach Council chairwoman.

Jerry Silbert, a member of the Committee In Solidarity with the Central American People and a sidelines protester, said he was there because of his concern for the people he knows in El Salvador.

"I attended a meeting in San Salvador about three years ago where I met several of the people who were killed recently — the Jesuit priest and the union leader," Silbert said. "They were the type of people I was brought up to idolize. To see them killed with guns purchased from my tax dollars is totally infuriating."

He said the U.S. government has not been telling the truth

about its activities in El Salvador. Silbert added that his intentions were to tell the truth at this demonstration.

Protesters were not the only people who came out in support of the demonstration. Local attorney David Atkins turned up to help the protesters who were arrested by providing them with free legal counsel.

"It's my personal belief that all attorneys and other people in the legal profession have an obligation to donate a substantial amount of their time to public causes," he said.

At about 11 a.m., after more than four hours of protesters blockading the building, Atkin came with news from the U.S. Magistrate's Office for those who had not yet been arrested.

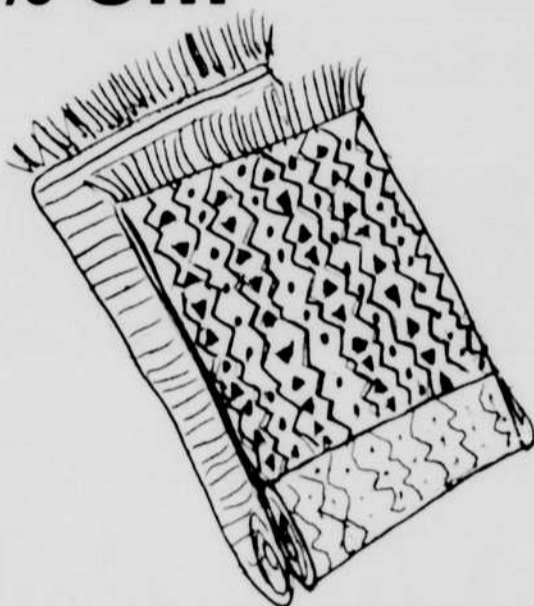
He told them the word from the Magistrate's Office was that they would not have to spend time in prison, but would instead probably be fined.

The entire episode ended at about 2 p.m., and charges were filed against all 29 of the protesters. Of the 29, citations were given to 14 while 12 others were given a group arraignment. The 12 arraigned will be sentenced on Dec. 7.

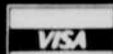

bowl game in 26 years, you have to go out and sell your team," Brooks said. "I think it also helped that some other teams lost on Saturday."

"But certainly Bill Byrne and his efforts in contacting people . . . were instrumental in our selection," he added.

The help Brooks spoke of came from several other teams after Saturday's games.

Florida and South Carolina both backed out of the Independence Bowl due to conflicts with final examinations. Baylor was considered by the Independence Bowl committee but lost to lowly Rice to eliminate itself.

That left Kentucky and Mississippi, who also could have drawn a lot of fans to Shreveport. But the Wildcats were 6-4 and have a game left with ninth-ranked Tennessee, and the Bulldogs are 5-5 with a

game left at Mississippi, who is headed to the Liberty Bowl.

The Independence Bowl liked Kentucky, but wanted a team such as Oregon, who comes in with four wins in its last five games.

Athletic Ticket Manager Hunt Holsapple announced that tickets for the Independence Bowl would go on sale at 9 a.m. Wednesday at the University ticket office.

Tickets for the game are \$25, and Holsapple said the Athletic Department is putting together a tour package through local travel agencies for people wanting to attend the game.

The Mizlou television network holds the broadcasting rights to the Independence Bowl, but Hellyer said the game will most assuredly be shown in Oregon and could be shown courtesy of the Oregon Sports Network.
