"We did reach our (75 percent) checkpoint," Swan said. "We made it just by the hair on our chin."

The county commissioners' donation came as a relief to WISTEC board members, Swan said, but it was not the conclusive factor in the board's decision to reopen.

"I'm not so sure we would have changed our minds (if the commissioners had voted against the grant)," Swan said. "It was a close one."

A specific date for reopening has not been set, but it will be sometime in late January or in February, McCarty said.

This is the first time WISTEC has received support from local government, Swan said. Besides the donation from Lane County Commissioners, WISTEC received money from Eugene and Springfield City Councils.

Although the magazines printed a total of 694 health articles within the five-year period of study, Kessler said she did not find any features, editorials or news stories that discussed women's health in relation to smoking.

The only mention magazines gave to this topic was in newsbriefs, which are short articles of about 50 words. Kessler said she found a total of eight newsbriefs during the five-year period.

Kessler also found tobacco companies provided a large amount of revenue to the six

magazines.

Cigarette advertisements covered as little as eight percent of the ad pages in *Cosmopolitan* and as much as 17.1 percent in *McCall's*.

In addition, a large majority of the cigarette ads ran on premium pages, which are inside front, inside back and back cover pages. Magazines charge advertisers higher rates to advertise on these pages.

Good Housekeeping, which was used as the control group in the study, does not accept cigarette ads.

Kleban said the business also serves as "a resource for people to make and sell ethnic crafts. We want to send as much money back to the source as possible."

Kleban said although other local import stores sell goods from the sister cities, none of them offer goods exclusively from those cities.

Global Partners sells everything from rugs to jewelry and has prices varying from \$1.50 to \$600. It is primarily ethnic art, not mass-produced, Kleban said.

"We'd rather sell something that was one in a 100 than one in 1,000," Kleban said. "The

"The crafts are made by families and small groups. They can't make a thousand."

Both Thompson and Kleban have experience in the retail business. They previously worked in the natural foods grocery business.

"It sure is different from the grocery business," Thompson said. "You can't just call someone up and order things for next week."

"You have to drop a lot of American business attitudes and hope for the best when dealing with (international business sources)," he said. "I've developed lots of patience."
