"There are not any differences in terms of crimes, regardless of religious, political or sexual preference." Rutledge said. "If someone can show intent to harass a person because of prejudice against their lifestyle, it can be a crime under the protected class law instituted on Oct. 1, 1989.

Rutledge said training in this area for police officers is very limited right now, but explained that a training program on sexual orientation and homophobia would begin in January or February. The department is still trying to locate experts to initiate and conduct the program for all EPD staff and of-

EPD has also changed the way crimes have been reported. For the last six months hate crimes have been tracked and categorized for each protected class rather than lumped together as harassment, said Rutledge.

Recently the EPD moved hate crimes to a priority one status, which consists of life threatening situations. During March of last year, racial incidences became a community concern.

'It became a priority when minorities began to demand that we take it seriously." Rutledge said.

'We changed the way we responded to those types of calls as a result of community feedback." Rutledge said. "Crimes are reported and officers file a written report whether or not an investiga-

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Transients and their affects on businesses in Eugene was also addressed.

Sergeant Greg Zahar from the Community Response Team said a survey conducted by the police department shows that aggressive panhandlers, and disorderly conduct by intoxicated individuals are some of the main fears of merchants, customers and community members

Richard Greene, owner of Rainbow Optics on 13th Avenue, said there is a real problem with aggressive transients, whom he calls

Greene said that he has seen a marked increase in deterioration due to these predators during the past 12 years his business has occupied 13th Avenue.

"These people make it their business to harass other people which makes it difficult to conduct a business." Greene said. "I get phone calls everyday from clients who refuse to come to this facility because of this problem.

Greene said his workers are also harassed by these people.

"Over half the employees are women and there isn't one of them who hasn't been harassed by predators, Greene said.

EPD is trying to change this fear by increasing police patrol in the business districts of Eugene, said Rut-



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
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
