

Money sought for study

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — A state agency wants nearly \$500,000 to help prepare Oregon for an earthquake like the one that ripped through the San Francisco area in October.

Donald Hull, the state geologist, said in a letter to the Legislative Emergency Board that research indicates "considerable earthquake risk to the Western Oregon region in the future."

Hull plans to ask the board next month for \$489,000 to hire a full-time structural engineer, a map-maker and an office specialist to improve the state's readiness for an earthquake.

"We regard this request as an emergency situation," Hull said in his letter.

Hull said the request for a permanent earthquake team was based on the results of several government and university studies.

He said the most important product of the studies was evidence that Oregon suffered "very large" earthquakes as recently as several hundred years ago.

"As we accumulate more and more evidence it begins to look like Oregon has experienced major earthquakes in the past and, therefore, can expect major earthquakes in future," he said.
