Police Beat

The following is a list of campus area crimes taken from Office of Public Safety and Eugene Police Department reports between Nov. 28 and Dec. 5:

- A stolen bike was recovered by OPS on Dec. 5. A student reported he had discovered a bike similar to his, which was stolen in January. The student had kept the receipt with the serial number, which was checked and confirmed.

The stolen bike's user said she purchased had the bike for \$65 in February. The bike was returned to its previous owner.

- Stolen furniture from Walton Complex worth \$963 was reported returned to OPS on Dec. 5. The head housekeeper discovered all the furniture — a vacuum cleaner, a coffee table and two couches — back in its proper place in the complex dorms.

The furniture was reported stolen to OPS on Nov. 20.

- The theft of \$950 in audio cassettes, compact discs and listening equipment from a Walton Complex dorm room was reported to EPD on Dec. 3. The unknown suspect entered through the unlocked door.

- OPS recovered \$450 of items from car theft on Dec. 3. A \$250 purse and \$200 in miscellaneous items were found in the Pioneer Cemetery, following the report to EPD of these items' theft from the owner's car at 19th Avenue and Kincaid Street earlier that day.

The unknown suspect entered the car by breaking the rear window. A \$100 backpack, also stolen from the car, was not recovered.

- One subject was arrested for

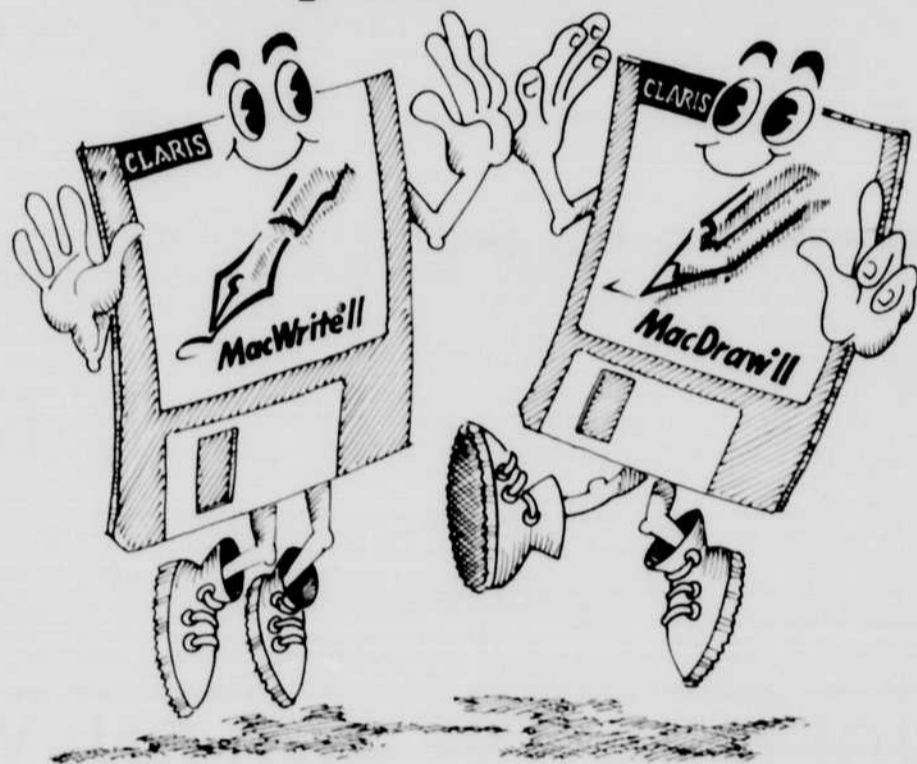
criminal trespass and resisting arrest, and another for criminal trespass and harassment, by OPS and EPD at Bean Complex on Nov. 29. The subjects, who are not University students, reportedly entered a dorm room uninvited, where one subject fondled the occupant's leg and the other wrote down her phone number.

Officers were dispatched to the area. While attempting to arrest the subjects, a scuffle ensued between the officers and one of the subjects.

- An \$869 cassette recorder was reported stolen from a locked room in Straub Complex to OPS on Nov. 28. There were no signs of forced entry by the unknown suspect.

- OPS reports 5 bikes stolen, and one additional bike recovered.
