"We've got a lot to learn from other nations and cul-

tures," Hoop said. "We want to here what you have to say before we embark on the final planning."

"I think this is very good. I'm very interested in environmental issues," said Fida Mohammad, Muslim Student Association representative. "It is something interesting and im-

portant to me."

Mohammad said many foreign students are concerned about the environment, but because they often have other time constraints they don't get involved.

"I think a lot of them have other priorities like language classes," Mohammad said. "I

think if they had the time they'd get involved."

The 1990 Earth Day marks the 20th anniversary of the international celebration. According to the coalition flyer, the original 1970 Earth Day was one of the largest organized demonstrations in history with over 20 million people partici-

pating world wide.

The day will be marked at the University with speakers, music, video presentations, workshops, symposiums and clean-up projects.

The coalition will also focus on a campus environmental audit to "examine what position the administration has for dealing with environmental issues," Hoop said.

In addition, students are organizing into committees within the coalition to handle events, speakers, fundraising and media relations.

Hoop said about 90 countries have pledged activities for the celebration, complementing the national and local Earth Day efforts.

"Earth Day 1990 is being organized in response to people's desire to act, and their uncertainty about what they can do," according to the flier. "It is rooted in the belief that people working together can accomplish extraordinary things."
