pulled within three at 35-32 at halftime.

Reynolds led the Ducks in first-half scoring with 16 while Oregon State's star guard Gary Payton was held to seven points and two assists. For the half, the Ducks, who registered seven dunks before intermission, outshot the Beavers 64 percent to 45.2 percent.

The Ducks held leads as large as six points for most of the second half, but Payton, who scored 23 second-half points to finish with a game-high 30, tied it at 58 with a free throw with 4:29 remaining.

Payton scored nine straight for the Beavers over the following 3:12, including a three-point play with 3:28 to play to give the Beavers their first lead of the game at 63-62.

Payton scored in the lane 10 seconds later to give Oregon State its largest lead of the game at 65-62. But Oregon guard Terrell Brandon, who led the Ducks with 21 points, hit a three-pointer with 2:31 left to tie it at 65.

Reynolds hit an eight-foot jump shot from the left baseline to put the Ducks up 67-65 with 1:48 remaining. But Payton scored a rebound basket to tie it with 1:17 left.

Oregon had a chance to take a lead, but Oregon center Richard Lucas lost the ball out of bounds with 52 seconds left. Lucas said later he was fouled by Payton on the play.

"He has quick hands and he reached in for the ball and slapped at me and got me on the arm and on the chest," Lucas said. "The ball went out of bounds, but I thought for sure they were going to call a foul."

But it was Oregon State's ball and time for the Beavers to set up for a chance at a game win-

ner by Payton.

But Payton's three-point attempt from the top of the key missed and Haskin fouled Oregon freshman forward Bob Fife on the rebound with 12 seconds left.

Reynolds stepped to the free throw line for the one-and-one, but Oregon State players protested that it was Fife who was fouled.

The officials agreed.

Fife, who had made all three of his free throws to that point, missed the front end of the one-and-one, giving the Beavers another shot at a game-winner.

Oregon State guard Allan Celestine took the ball the length of the floor to the free throw line and found Haskin open to the left of the basket. Haskin put up a reverse layup that bounced on the rim several times before rolling home with one second left.

After two timeouts, Haskin knocked Lucas' inbound pass from the backcourt away as time expired.

Oregon State coach Jimmy Anderson, who made his Mac Court debut as head coach of the Beavers, said the game-winning play was not designed, but was just a great individual effort.

"With just 11 seconds left, we had to get down the floor and do something," Anderson said. "Allan just made his penetration because there was no one there to give the ball to. Allan drew a little traffic and got the ball to Scott. It was not by design. Allan just made a good play."

Anderson stated what was all too obvious to Oregon fans when he spoke of Payton's second half performance.

"Gary took over in the last 10 minutes of the game," Anderson said. "I thought in the sec-

ond half, he played smarter and better. He had a little more patience on his shots."

Payton agreed.

"I knew I had to do more things with the ball in the second half," Payton said. "I think my teammates count on me to get us going and that is my job. If I start going, the rest of the team starts going. I started making my shots at the end."

Payton was pleased with the character his team showed in winning its seventh straight contest this season.

"We fought back after they had a big lead on us," he said. "That is why I like this team. They don't quit. Everybody keeps working harder and harder. Finally our defense started picking it up and we started chipping away at the end."

answered points, upping its lead to 55-27 at the 17:48 mark.

Rutgers attempted to close the gap, but the Ducks fought off the charge and opened its biggest lead of the game at 29 off a three-pointer by Selden. The count was 70-41 with 11:32 remaining.

Oregon utilized its bench and the game remained at a 20-point margin for the majority of the last 10 minutes. The final result was a 92-78 victory for Oregon.

"When they were in a zone in the first half, the key was moving the ball and getting the open shots," Heiny said.

"I think the defensive pressure affected them as well as the press," he said. "(Rutgers) had a number of turnovers that probably otherwise wouldn't have happened."

Free throws were also a factor in the Ducks' win over Oregon State Friday night in Corvallis. Oregon threw in 17 of 24 attempts at the line compared to the Beavers poor showing.

The Ducks held a one point lead at intermission with a 25-24 score. Oregon opened with

eight straight points in the second half and never looked back as the Ducks rolled to a 76-61 win.

Heiny gave a lot of credit to the Beavers for making the victory anything but easy.

"Defensively, I don't think we played well," Heiny said. "Offensively, we didn't play well, but a lot of that goes to Oregon State's credit."

Oregon had a balanced scoring attack with sophomore Stacy Wallenborn leading the way with 11 points. Senior Jacquie Semeniuk, sophomore Vonda Anderson, and Selden contributed 10 points each. Kasperski grabbed 11 rebounds for the Ducks.

As a team, Oregon shot 43.8 percent from the field.

Oregon is now 10-4 overall with a 2-1 record in the Pacific-10 Conference.

The Ducks travel north Thursday night to face the Washington Huskies, 11-2 (2-1). Saturday night, Oregon heads to Washington State where it will face off with the 10-3 (2-1) Cougars.

pounds. Craig battled OSU junior Neil Russo to a 6-6 draw to keep Oregon's lead at a dozen. Russo came into the match with a 16-5-1 season mark.

George Johnston dominated Oregon State's Dan Alar 13-3 in the 150 class. After that, the Beavers moved within seven by earning victories at 158, 167, and 177 pounds.

Oregon senior Joe Rissone clinched a Duck victory by taking a 4-0 win over Beaver Chris McGowan at 190 pounds.

In a dramatic heavyweight battle, OSU's Matt Willhite, the nation's 11th ranked big man, defeated Oregon's Cam Strahm 3-1 by scoring a two-point takedown with seven seconds remaining in the match.

The dual meet victory moved Oregon's season record to 7-1 while Oregon State fell to 9-9-1. The Ducks and Beavers will meet again Feb. 16 in McArthur Court.

Oregon will be in action again Jan. 26 when it competes in the Oklahoma State Invitational.

The Ducks will return to the friendly confines of the Pit Feb. 2 against the Portland State Vikings.

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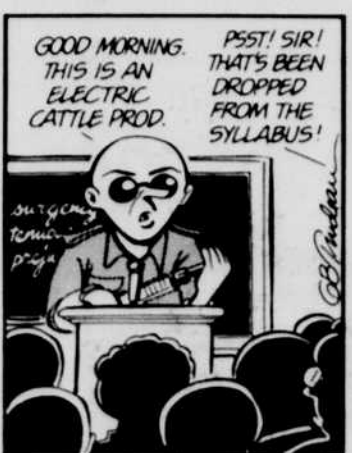
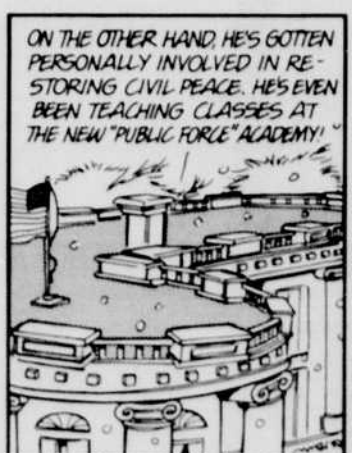
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
