

Police Beat

The following is a list of campus area crimes taken from Office of Public Safety and Eugene Police Department reports between Jan. 9 and Jan. 15:

- A purse-snatching on 19th Avenue was reported to EPD on Jan. 15. The three purse owners were walking east of Emerald Street with their umbrellas up during a rainstorm when they heard footsteps behind them.

The two suspects ran up beside them, grabbed their purses and ran off, causing one of the owners to fall down. She suffered scrapes, bruises and pains to both knees.

Both suspects are described as brown-haired, medium-built white males between 18 and 22-years-old.

- A smashed window at the EMU was reported to EPD on Jan. 14. The 3-foot-6 by 9-foot window was apparently smashed when the suspect attempted to enter the building to attend a dance.

- The theft of an Apple computer and laser printer worth \$6,000 from the Education Annex was reported to EPD on Jan. 13.

The unknown suspect broke a window pane, reached inside to open the window and crawled inside the building. The computer's

cable lock was cut; the printer was not secured.

- A case of criminal mischief resulting in \$200 damage to a car in the Bean Complex parking lot was reported to EPD on Jan. 12. An unknown suspect dented the driver's door, scratched a wood and damaged a door lock.

- The theft of a \$437 sound amplifier from Gilbert Hall sometime during Christmas break was reported to EPD on Jan. 11. There were no signs of forced entry in the theft, in which the unknown suspect apparently entered through the front door to the room where the amplifier was kept.

- The theft of a pool cue and carrying case totaling \$185 from EMU was reported to EPD on Jan. 11.

- A \$100 Apple Macintosh computer mouse was reported stolen from Deschutes Hall to EPD on Jan. 11.

- A \$355 VCR in Deady Hall was reported stolen sometime during Christmas break to EPD on Jan. 9. The cable was pried off by the unknown suspect. There were no signs of forced entry.

- In addition, OPS reports one bike stolen, none recovered.

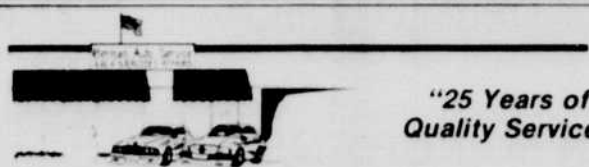
