Ducks survive scare to beat WSU

Washington State guard Bennie Seltzer gave Oregon a scare Sunday, but the Ducks responded, going on an 11-0 run late in the game to take a

Birmingham, Ala., hit three consecutive three-pointers to lead Washington State on a 9-2 run to pull the Cougars to within one at 62-61 with 5:17 remaining.

Seltzer's bombing proved to be just a wake-up call for the Ducks and their fans.

After Oregon forward Bob Fife scored in the lane and Seltzer hit a free throw to make it 64-62 Oregon, the Ducks went on their 11-point run to take a 75-62 lead with 2:37 remaining.

Sophomore guard Terrell Brandon started the run by hitting a 15-footer, followed by a Richard Lucas steal and break-away dunk to make it 68-62 with 4:02 left.

Over the next 1:01 Oregon scored five points in one possession to take a double-digit lead at 73-62.

Oregon started its pivotal five-point run on a fast-break layup by Kevin Mixon. Seltzer fouled Mixon on the play, giving the junior guard a free throw.

Mixon missed the free throw, but Fife rebounded the miss and passed to Lucas, who drew a foul going to the basket.

Lucas hit his first free throw making it 71-62. He missed the second, but again Fife rebounded the miss and scored to give the Ducks the 11-point lead.

Seltzer and forward Juan Thomas each hit three-pointers for Washington State after that, but Lucas and Keith Reynolds each had four points and Fife a free throw to close out scoring for the Ducks.

Monson said Oregon's rebounding was the key for the Ducks. For the game, the Ducks battered the Cougars on the boards, outrebounding them 42-26.

"I think the thing that pleased me the most today was our rebounding," Monson said. "I made it a point and I challenged them [to work harder on rebounding]. I thought Lucas was especially strong and Fife got some key offensive rebounds, too."

tougher-than-it-sounds 82-68 win before a sleepy McArthur Court crowd of 7,015.

"Again, we seem to keep letting people hang around and hang around until we don't have much breathing room," Oregon coach Don Monson said. "but I think that's the nature of league games."

"Usually teams are going to be in there most of the time in your league games," he said. "But I'm pleased. We got two wins this weekend and we haven't had two league wins in one week for a while around here."

The Ducks, now 4-3 in the Pac-10 and 9-7 overall, led by eight at 60-52 with 6:49 remaining and appeared ready to put the Cougars, 1-7 in the Pac-10 and 7-11 overall, away.
