sor Wayne Westling. "This is something that has been brewing for 10 years or more."

Law professor Peter Swan said the quality of the program is excellent, although the ABA's complaints were serious in terms of both academics and public relations.

"We're probably the only program waiting in line with an albatross hanging around our neck," Swan said. "(But) were not half way to hell or anything like that."

Most of the ABA's complaints deal with the law school's capital budget, including expanding the size of the law library and the acquisition of new equipment, Swan said.

Moreover, the law school must reduce the number of adjunct professors in favor of five or six permanent faculty positions, he said.

"(Adjunct professorships) are something we've had to rely on

more often in the last two years than we should have," Swan said.

Tim Terrell, a third-year law student with the Student Bar Association, said students are not worried about disaccreditation but feel the ABA's actions are political

moves.

"A lot of people view it as a political ploy by the ABA to force the state Legislature to increase support levels," Terrell said.

While some students are not worried by the ABA's threats, others including SBA President Emilio Bandiero are frustrated by the state's lack of action.

Bandiero said he is surprised that the law faculty choose to remain at the University given the current salary levels.

"If the people of this state want a law school, then they're going to have to support it accordingly," he said. "The people who need to do it are legislators and the governor."
