Oregon then turned up the defensive pressure, using its quickness to disrupt the Huskies with full court pressure.

Forward Bob Fife scored in the lane and Washington committed two straight turnovers for three Brandon points to bring Oregon to within four at 38-34. Oregon then went on a 10-5 run to take its first lead since early in the second half at 44-43.

Neither team was able to take a lead larger than five points after that. Washington grabbed its last lead at 53-52, but Brandon hit two free throws with 1:18 left to put the Ducks up for good.

"We really didn't want to press, but the press helped us when we were behind. We used it to pick up the pace," Monson said.

"It was a lackadaisical ballgame a lot of the time," he added. "I commend my kids for coming back."

Monson said the pressing defense wasn't a problem fatigue-wise for the Ducks in the second half.

"The first half, we stood around so nobody could be

tired," he said.

Nance said shooting and execution were a problem for his team. To compound the 15 turnovers, Washington shot a miserable 39.3 percent for the game.

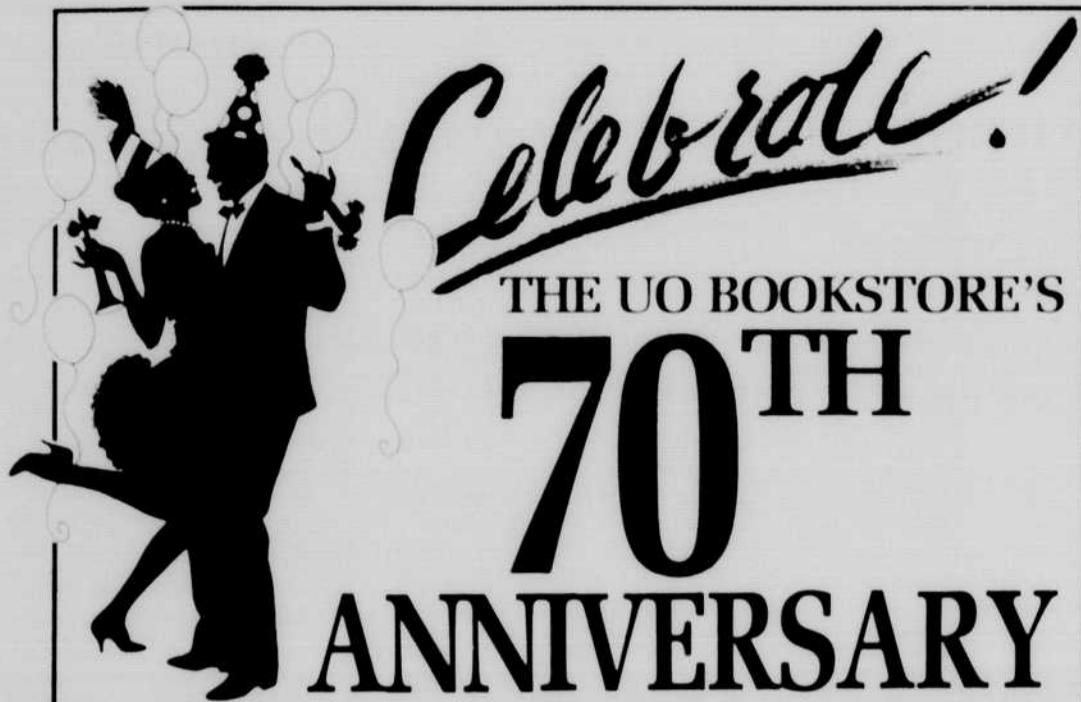
"Shooting percentages pretty much told the story," Nance said. "We really had difficulty in getting into our scheme. We seemed a little confused at times."

Nance called the game a "sad ending" for the Huskies, who played their last home game of the season, and for Recasner, who played the last home game of his career at Washington.

"It was just a sad ending for the team," Nance said. "Losing your last home game of the year leaves a bad taste in your mouth all summer. I don't relish that."

Reynolds led Oregon with 19 points, followed by 18 from Brandon. Meekins and Merritt led Washington with 16 and 12 points, respectively. Recasner, who averages better than 16 points per game, was held to 10.

Brown and Meekins had 12 rebounds each.



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
