break down the video of the next opponent into groups of plays that are the same. He will put all of the attempts at the 55 press together and all of Oregon's high-low offensive sequences together. This is so the coaches can watch every attempt by the Ducks to run an individual play in just a few minutes.

This allows the team to pick out the weaknesses in its opponent and parts of their own game that need to be worked on. Rice will also break up the opponents tape into their plays so that the Ducks are prepared for everything the other team has to offer.

"Watching and studying the films is important," Rice said, "because if we see something on tape and aren't ready for it during the game we (the assistant coaches) feel responsible."

Like many other graduate assistants across the country, Rice acts as a liaison between the coaching staff and the players. He believes that of all of the coaches, he is the closest to the players, but adds that the Duck players and coaches are a close-knit family who tend to get along well both on and off the court.

While his age may be an asset when dealing with the players, it could also be a liability when dealing with the rest of the coaching staff. Rice, however downplays this notion by telling how he was treated when he first arrived in Eugene.

"George Libbon (Oregon's top assistant coach) took me under his wing and showed me

what it takes to become a college coach," Rice said. "These guys are a lot of fun to work with."

"The only disadvantage of being the youngest is that I am usually the target of their jokes," he said with a smile.

Rice also enjoys working with Monson.

"He is a great guy," he said. "He is straight forward and will let you know exactly how he feels about what you have done. You always know where you stand with him, and it is easy to be dedicated to a man who is honest like that."

Monson feels that the experience Rice is getting at Oregon now will help make him a better head coach someday.

"I think Leon has a lot of good attributes that will make him a good coach," Monson said. "His best asset is his ability to communicate with the players."

Because of NCAA regulations, graduate assistants are not allowed to recruit off campus, but Rice is allowed to help in the recruiting process when recruits visit the Oregon campus. He also plays a key part in the producing the Ducks recruiting video during the offseason.

This is Rice's final season as a graduate assistant due to a two year limit for graduate assistants set by the NCAA. His future is undecided but he hopes to wind up coaching college basketball somewhere.

However, he said that decisions on his future can wait until after the Ducks finish this season.

Players of the week named

Oregon State forward Shanna Daniels was named Monday as the Pacific-10 Conference player of the week in women's basketball.

Daniels scored a career-high 23 points on 11-for-15 shooting and had 10 rebounds and six assists as the Beavers broke a 17-game losing string Saturday with a 69-63 win over Washington State.

Daniels, a 5-foot-11 junior from Sandy, Ore, added 10 points, 10 rebounds and eight assists in the Beavers' 73-56

loss to Washington last Thursday.

California guard Keith Smith was named as Pac-10 player of the week in men's basketball after scoring 49 points in the Bears' road wins over UCLA and Southern California.

Smith had 22 points in Cal's 79-74 win over UCLA in Pauley Pavilion, the Bears' first win in Pauley and first over UCLA on the road in since the 1959-60 season. He added a career-high 27 to go with six assists in a 74-70 win over Southern Cal.
