'Hamlet' opens run in Arena Theatre

The most performed play in the world comes to campus tonight. *Hamlet*, one of William Shakespeare's most famous plays, opens tonight at 8 in Villard Hall's Arena Theatre, 1109 Old Campus Lane. Additional 8 p.m. performances are set for Feb. 24, March 1-3 and 9-10.

After the death of his father, an experience that tremendously moves him, Hamlet must prove to all the murderous guilt of his uncle, the new king, and justify the bloody act of retribution.

"It's a play of revenge coming undecidedly," Director Faber DeChaine said. "Hamlet is a good, morally upright young man." Faber DeChaine said it is this good nature that "puts Hamlet into a quandary." said DeChaine.

Because Hamlet addresses the universal issue of power, its theme cuts across the borders. "The play's universality still holds up," DeChaine said. "It's about corruption and power and how people of good char-

acter deal with that."

Hamlet's theme is so universal that DeChaine said the play will be enjoyable for people who aren't familiar with the plot as well as for people who are well-schooled in it.

The 40-member cast has been rehearsing since the beginning of winter term and has had the entire play letter-perfect in memory for more than a month.

"It's very well rendered," DeChaine explained. "It's well prepared, and the discipline of the students is very strong."

"This is the most popular and the most oft-performed play in the world," DeChaine said. "There must be a reason for that!"

Tickets are \$6 general public and \$4 students and seniors. They are available at the Robinson Theatre box office from 12:30 to 4 Monday through Saturday and from 6:30 to 8 on performance nights, or by calling 346-4191.

"This is a great play, and it's well-poised and well-rendered, which it is, then it should be a successful show," DeChaine said.

a local basis, if people really want to buy my music they can come to me and buy a tape," he explained.

Currently, Alan keeps busy in Eugene with University performances and Thursday night performances at The Beamery, 152 W. 5th Ave.

"College crowds have always been really attentive and really warm to me," he said. "I'm really fond of that environment."

"He's very popular, he's great to work with and everyone here loves him," said Leah Miller, Sweetser's hall president in charge of coordinating the upcoming Walton performance. "He really supports our program and, besides that, he's the nicest guy on earth."

Over at The Beamery, Deb Watson, bar employee, said, "People really get into his music. He's talented and he puts out some pretty interesting sounds."

"He's a cross between Michael J.

Fox and REO Speedwagon," said Deanne Zirkir, another Beamery bar employee.

In the past 25 years, Alan has refined his music and added more abstractions and rhythm, and within the next five years he hopes to be recording on a label.

"I'd really like to have a label, but I never envision myself selling myself," he said. "Whatever happens, it won't be at the expense of who I genuinely am."

For Alan, music gives him direction and voice, and because of that his music is chiefly honest. "It's important to be true to our natures and less concerned about making blanket statements," he said.

After performing for more than twenty years with his voice and his guitar, he has come to understand more than he did in the beginning. "When I was young, music was my voice and my liberty in the world

and I didn't know it," he said. "Now, I know it."

"In the beginning, music was a need for me. Now it's a path to discovery," he added.

Alan gets so much enjoyment and peace from his music, that he hopes to be playing the guitar and singing until the day he dies. "I hope someday fall off the stage playing music," he said.

Alan's great-grandfather, who lived until he was in his 80s, died suddenly while sitting in his barn, talking to his brother and sister. Alan wants to do the same — die doing what he enjoys most.

With everything that's behind Alan's music, it's no wonder campus word-of-mouth is in his favor. Aside from the music and the lyrics and the voice, just the simple honesty of his profession would tend to fill performance rooms, as he does at every show.
