"We're in favor of the government providing more options for students to pay off loans." Hughes said. "We're opposed to making students jump through hoops in order to get a higher education.

USSA is proposing that the community service occur after college rather than before USSA also wants it to be truly voluntary, giving students the option to pay their loans back through some kind of credit system instituted through community service.

Students should also have the right to pay off their debts by getting their own job if they chose to. Hughes said.

Another proposal by Bush would force universities to withhold financial aid checks from incoming freshman for 60 days. Hughes said. He said Bush claims this would eliminate the number of freshman dropping out of school who keep their financial aid rewards.

It should be made easy for students to go to school. Hughes said. Restrictions like this will deter the number of incoming freshman creating an erosion of the educational system on the whole.

Although USSA's main focus for this session is economic access, various issues, such as child care and civil rights, will be addressed. Hughes said.

Community issues will also be discussed, said Armando Morales, vice-chair for USSA. "This is a chance to explain to senators about the problems of the community as well as the

students." He said he will address such issues as housing, homeless, drugs and alcohol.

The March 1 to March 5 conference will include intensive workshops and discussions on the Clean Air Act and other pending legislative bills, outlining lobbying strategies and implications of the bills if they are passed. Hughes said. Various political speakers will also be in attendance

The workshops will train people to lobby Congress using the most effective methods available," said Kelvin Wee, co-chair for the International Student Caucus

In addition, region representatives will be meeting to discuss the effects of different legislative proposals on their own areas. Hughes said.

The Reverend Jesse Jackson will lead USSA's final lobbying efforts at noon March 5, on the west Capitol steps in front of the Capitol Building. Wee said. March 5 is National Lobby Day.

University USSA members have appointments next Monday to see State Congressional representatives Peter DeFazio. Les AuCoin, Ron Wyden, Senator Mark Hatfield and Senator Bob Packwood, Hughes said.

The three board members. Hughes, Morales, and Karen Gaffney, affirmative action officer, will be accompanied by three appointed University students. Lisa Lawrence, Heidi Schultz of the Survival Center. and Bob Hult of Men Against

"I'm excited about having the opportunity to go to D.C. to

help lobby for the higher education budget," Lawrence said. "It's important that we get our needs across.

"I not only see myself as a representative of the University of Oregon but as a representative for women and students of color." Lawrence said.

Lawrence will also be attending the student of color caucus. a meeting for minority students to discuss the implications of financial aid changes on their community

The University is one of 127 colleges nationwide that will be attending the weekend conference in Washington D.C. sponsored by the United States Student Association.

Jackson said the chance of a campus epidemic is minimal, although health center officials will not know whether the student transmitted the virus for at least the two week incubation period for measles.

"It is one of those diseases that can cause epidemics." Jackson said. "We do know that 90 to 95 percent of students probably are protected against measles even if they've had one measles vaccine."

The Student Health Center is recommending students and faculty who were born after 1956 and immunized prior to 1977 receive a second measles injection because of deficiencies in the old shot.

To prevent a measles problem, the health center announced Monday it would offer free measles shots to students weekdays from 1 to 4 p.m. until March 16.

"The reason that there's a problem is that it has been shown in the last few years that the original measles shots children received when they were young are beginning to wear off," said Dr. Michael Dunn, who is in charge of the health center's immunization program.

Dunn said measles is more

serious in older individuals in terms of symptoms because children's immune systems are more suited to hattle the disease.

lackson said the student was the first measles case at the University in at least 11 years, but that it is not unex-

Five cases were reported at Southern Oregon State College last year, and over 20 cases have been reported this year at South Eugene and Willamette high schools.

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education voted at its Feb. 16 meeting to require all incoming freshman to have two measles vaccinations before being admitted to prevent further outbreaks such as the one at SOSC.

"We clearly know that there have been outbreaks at other college campuses,' Jackson said. "I don't know why the University of Oregon would be any differ-

Jackson said he does not foresee a vaccine shortage problem that is facing several private clinics in the community.

"We might run into a temporary problem where we have so many students coming in, but I don't foresee a permanent problem," he


