dress such issues as racism and discrimination, child care, and student fees; however, he said they were hesitating to come out with an ironclad stance on the mandatory student health insurance debates until the voters do in April.

"We do have a stance, but at the same time we would much rather have the student body make the decision," Maples said. "Whatever stance we have on it would be obsolete."

Maples and Cushman said they will run both their campaign and, if they win, their administration on a modified "open-door" policy.

"We feel that an open-door policy is only half the answer," he said. "An open door policy implies that we sit down in the ASUO and we open our doors. We think it is important that we seek out open doors."

"We do want students to come up to us and say, 'Hey, you're Steve Maples, you're running for president; hey you're Diane Cushman, you're running for VP,'" Cushman said. "Ask us a question, we'll be honest with you, we're not making a lot of big campaign promises and a lot of rhetoric. We're here for the stu-

dents."

"The ASUO office is pretty intimidating and can be for your average student," Maples said. "That's why we'd rather go out on campus and go where the average student would feel more comfortable talking to us."

Cushman said the ticket will be helped by the governmental experience the two have.

"We've had an opportunity to view leadership through our college careers from different points of view and different angles, and I think that is crucial," she said. "In a University as large as the University of Oregon, we have an opportunity to bring in a couple more points of view and look at every angle."

Although Cushman resigned from her post as a financial tag, Maples said he will continue to participate in the IFC.

"I recommend anyone who really cares to come down to the meetings," he said. "I stand behind all the decisions I've made, and I think its great because I can be held accountable. People can see through all the smoke and mirrors and see my decisions and how I come down."
