"I believe we are nearing the sunset of affluent environmentalism and the sunrise of acute environmentalism," Hair said. "This is a change in focus."

Hair defined affluent environmentalists as being people that care about a certain issue, but do not look beyond that issue. Acute environmentalists are the people that realize they are living with the consequences of environmental abuse, Hair said.

Hair said he has witnessed more positions change in the last 18 months than in the last 18 years. Hair attributed these changes in attitudes to all of the environmental accidents and tragedies that have occurred in the last 18 months.

Hair believes national security is going to be redefined in the future.

"We are in a time of new leadership," Hair said. "Lead-

ership is not the hoarding of power."

For too long environmentalists have been willing and content to sit on the political sideline," he said. "I believe we will soon have an environmentalist president."

Hair finished by telling the audience that any cause worth devoting their life to is worth dying for.

Shiva said she cannot imagine the world getting out of the mess it is in without changing its attitudes and methods.

"We can no longer see the planet we live upon as a chess board on which people move the pieces around," Shiva said. "Undoing the lessons of development is the first step."

Shiva called the struggle of people against people the struggle of remembering against forgetting.

munizations. The free shots will be offered from 1 to 4 p.m. until the end of winter term.

Jackson said the hours could be extended again depending on demand for injections.

"It's been really busy, but we'd like to encourage students to get in here and get a second vaccination," he said.

Dr. Michael Dunn, who directs the health center's immunization program, said the vaccine used prior to 1980 has been shown to lose effectiveness after a period of time.

Health center officials recommend University students, faculty and staff born after 1957 and immunized for measles be-

fore 1980 get a second measles shot.

Jackson said the health center is not running short of the measles vaccine, although the Greyhound bussing strike forced Jackson to drive to Portland Friday afternoon to pick up a vaccine shipment.

The health center is offering free measles shots to students and combination measles-rubella and measles-rubella-mumps shots for \$5 and \$10, respectively. Faculty can receive a measles shot for \$17.

Early symptoms of measles include a fever, cough, running nose, and red eyes, which then develops into a rash.
