Student U.N. organization plans memorial to University professor

Although the Students for United Nations Club has not been officially recognized, they have already begun to plan activities, starting with a memorial to deceased Professor Thomas Hovet and the placement of a UN flag on campus.

The immediate concern is to establish a memorial for Professor Hovet, who played an instrumental role in the development of the United Nations charter in 1945, said Pavlinguar Haukeland, SUN president. April 5 is designated as his memorial day.

"Because he was so influential in the UN and the University, as well as international law, I think it's only right that he should be remembered in some way," said Dyna Goff, SUN secretary and Hovet memorial member.

The group hopes to place a UN flag on campus as a memorial or establish a plaque or display in the EMU, Goff said. She said SUN is also willing to do-

Based on this experience he devised a six step procedure to follow in order to place a UN flag on any campus. The first step is to get faculty and student support, as was done with professor Gossop. The second thing students did was to submit a petition declaring the university an international university.

Thirdly, the petitioners held student forums on campus so students could voice their opinions on the issue. Haukeland said he received much criticism by students who worried whether or not it would be appropriate to have the UN flag next to the U.S. flag. After coming to an agreement, a petition with signatures of students supporting a UN flag was submitted to the administration. It was followed by publicity until the measure was put to a vote and passed by a majority of the 10,000 students attending Southern University of Illinois, he said.

Because the whole process took about a year, Haukeland

SUN has divided its group into nine different committees, such as the UN flag and the Thomas Hovet memorial. Each focuses on a specific issue of concern, Haukeland said.

The model UN committee will focus on various Eugene high schools. Each school will be designated as a certain country, participating in that country's regular national events and observing their activities, said Cornett, model UN committee member.

Another committee will work on getting a "planethood" in every college classroom, enabling students to see a global view of the world without the boundaries of all the countries, Cornett said.

"Putting a poster of the planet in each classroom will show that we are all related and should work together," said Janelle Parr, SUN treasurer and planethood committee member. "It will also remind them of the peace needed."

Parr said she has ideas for the fundraising committee, which include bake sales at the bookstore and community service. The money raised by this committee will be used to pay for conferences, speakers and other events, she said.

The UN effectiveness and forums group will conduct weekly or bi-monthly forums on UN activities and implications. Each forum will focus on a different geographic area. Students will be able to voice their opinions and discuss issues of concern to that region, Cornett said. He hopes the group will be able to bring in outside speakers, University faculty, and international students to give their perspectives.

SUN will also be trying to formulate a bi-monthly newsletter concentrating on United Nations issues, Cornett said.

Other committees include the Decade for International Law and Law day and Earth Week.

Membership is open to anyone interested in the United Nations and world issues.
