Women's groups get IFC funding

Not all get requested budgets

The Incidental Fee Committee allocated \$341,156 to nine student groups at its meeting Tuesday.

The Women's Center, a women's assistance organization and umbrella group housing offices of other women's organizations, received \$31,908 for next year, a 12 percent increase over the 1989-90 budget season of \$28,471.

However, the committee allocated less than the center had asked for, with the IFC voting in favor of a revised budget eliminating the funds requested to hire a full-time receptionist.

"We're encouraging groups not to add another position because of the (University) enrollment cap," said IFC member Paul Nhem.

Women's Center Director Hasani Kudera said the position was necessary to improve services at the center.

"You're limiting the program entirely," Kudera said.

But committee members Chad Bennion, Joe Revill and Nhem suggested the center could use a college-credit in-

ternship system to attract people to the job.

The Crisis Center received a \$14,674 budget allocation for the 1990-91 season, a 3.5 percent increase from last year's budget of \$14,167.

The center has overspent a total of \$23,000 during the past five years, Bennion said.

The deficit spending comes out of a currently nonexistent surplus that remains at the end of the fiscal year, said ASUO Finance Coordinator Tracy Naber.

In other business, the committee voted 4-0 to allocate \$222,740 to the ASUO Child Care Subsidy, with Bennion, Revill and Nhem abstaining.

The allocation is a 68 percent increase of last year's budget of \$132,640, due to a general increase in program subsidies.

The IFC voted 5-0 to allocate \$23,379 to Amazon Cooperative Child Care, with Nhem and Revill abstaining.

The allocation is a 20.9 percent increase from last year's budget of \$19,338. The increase was due to work-study salary increases.

Project Saferide received a \$15,752 allocation, a 0.6 per-

cent increase from last year's budget of \$15,654.

Forensics, the University's debate society and speech club, received \$12,605 for next year's budget, a 2.4 percent increase over last year's allocation of \$12,420. IFC chair Tonija Swires was not present at that vote.

The IFC voted 3-0 to allocate \$11,766 to the Rape Crisis Network for next year, with Bennion, Nhem and Swires abstaining. Revill was not present at that allocation vote.

A \$2,000 telephone answering system is the reason for the 20 percent increase from the 1989-90 budget of \$9,790.

The committee voted 6-1 to allocate \$4,946 for 1990-91 to Women's Referral and Resource Center, a women's assistance organization, with Bennion voting against the allocation.

The allocation is a 0.8 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$4,882.

Women in Transition, another women's assistance organization, received a \$3,386 allocation, a 16 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$2,917. The increase came from the switch in the co-directors' salaries from stipend to work-study classification.

- Three metal folding chairs worth \$20 each were reported stolen from the McAlister Hall lounge to EPD on Feb. 28.
- Three candy bars were reported stolen from a Bean Complex vending machine to EPD on Feb. 27. A custodian reported the candy bars had been taken out of the machine, which apparently had been forced open with a coat hanger.
- A University student's Levi's jacket and set of keys were reported stolen from the Fenton Hall math library to OPS on Feb. 27. The owner briefly left the jacket, containing the keys, in the library, and returned to find the items gone. The total

loss is \$59.

- A public indecency at 16th Avenue and Patterson Street was reported to EPD on Feb. 21.

The subject then ran past the victim, turned to face her and masturbated.
