cause of this. Hyman spent a lot of time figuring out how people performed tricks in his early days as a magician.

Hyman now describes himmodern-day as a ghostbuster, mostly for government agencies.

Some of the more interesting claims Hyman has investigated include one by a woman who was able to read through her fingertips and another by a man who did research on cells found in human saliva.

In the case of the woman, a doctor wanted funding to investigate further the claim that she could read regular print through her fingertips. He hoped to teach the technique to the blind.

After looking into the claim. Hyman said it was clear that the woman was cheating. Curiously. Hyman said, the woman had no motive to cheat the doc-

In the case of the doctor who collected saliva, the doctor used cells from saliva in a test tube to tell when the person who gave the saliva was agitat-

The doctor claimed that he could tell when a person was agitated, whether they were in the next room or a mile or two away, by whether or not their saliva was agitated in the test

On the National Council Against Health Fraud, Hyman looks into all kinds of quackery, mainly people who claim they can cure diseases such as cancer and AIDS.

The Committee for the Investigation of Claims for the Paranormal acts as a skeptical inquirer and provides a skeptical view of the paranormal. This committee publishes a journal that Hyman described as a "counter of the National En-

As a member of a subcommittee of the National Research Council Committee, Hyman explores to what extent people are deceived for groups such as the CIA. The CIA uses the committee's research to see if it can tell whether or not informants are lying

The CIA feels they can tell when they are being deceived. but objective tests show that they can't." Hyman said. "The CIA does no better than college students. The difference is that college students know they can't tell when they are being deceived.

Hyman has authored or coauthored four books on various subjects dealing with both psychology and the paranormal. His newest work. The Elusive Quarry, is a collection of his writings about parapsychology and the paranormal.

Hyman said people do get outraged when he finds that they are fraudulent, but that for the most part he is a fair critic.

People do get outraged as this is a very emotional issue. Hyman said. "Many people have built their lives on this (parapsychology) and when they are called on it, it hurts."

"I try to be fair, and for the most part, I am on good terms with parapsychologists. I am a fair critic in that I at least read what they do.

Hyman's main interest currently is whether or not there is anything to parapsychology.

Hyman said he finds it funny and ironic that with all of the events that have occurred in the Eastern Bloc countries, now psychics are appearing for the first time on television in Rus-

'Swindlers are over there for the first time." Hyman said. So maybe now it's off to Russia for Ray Hyman.
