Indonesian celebration ushers in festival week

The International Student Association is gearing up to celebrate its 27th annual International Festival next week with a schedule full of events to suit all tastes.

A continent will be explored and celebrated each day of the week, beginning with Indonesian Night at 6 p.m. Sunday in the EMU Ballroom. Tickets are \$6 for students and \$7.50 for the general public.

Under the theme "Gilang Kharisma" (meaning "extraordinary"), Indonesian Night will begin with a buffet dinner followed by Indonesian costumed dancers, music and song and martial arts performances.

"The whole show is kind of like a dinner theater," said Caroline Steele, ISA director.

"Indonesian night represents Indonesian traditional and contemporary art," said Juanita Soerakoeseomah, ISA assistant director. "We want to show the diversity of Indonesian talent on campus."

Indonesian Night is produced by the Indonesian Student Association, an ISA agency, while International Festival is produced by ISA itself. The week's shows and activities will feature both international and American students.

"There are about 100 people involved with Indonesian night, and they're all Indonesian people on campus who are involved in our organization," Steele said. "That's including performers, decorators, stage managers, programmers, food people and ticket people."

Indonesian Night has been a part of the International Festival for the past four years, and every year the show changes.

"It's always different because there is a new turnover of students each year," Steele explained.

This is the first year martial art has

been included in the show. "Indonesian martial art isn't really well known," said Soerakoeseomah, a native of Indonesia. "This year we wanted to show that Indonesia does have an art of self-defense."

Adding to the show as a whole will be the costuming. "Everyone will be in costumes, ranging from the very traditional to the very contemporary, and it's very beautiful," Steele said.

"Some of the costumes were made by the students and some of them were brought over from Indonesia," Soerakoeseomah added.

ISA is expecting 500 to 550 people to show for the evening, which would fill the ballroom to capacity. "Indonesian Night has become a very popular event," Steele said.

"Indonesian night is unique because people can experience the Indonesian culture." Soerakoeseomah said. "Instead of traveling all the way to Indonesia, people can see Indonesia in the Ballroom."

After Sunday night's opening, the International Festival will continue throughout the week, with Monday through Friday's events being free.

Monday will celebrate Africa and the Middle East. A slide presentation titled "A Glimpse of the Maasai" is among the many events scheduled for the day. Events will include a Kenyan photo exhibit, movies and slide presentations.

Tuesday is Americas Day and will run from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Featured attractions will be slide presentations, Latin American music performed by Freddy Vilches and Company, and *American Pictures*, a multi-media show of a Danish man's journey through the American underclass.

The continent of Asia will be celebrated Wednesday.

Scheduled events include a Philippines photo exhibit, dances, slide shows, movies and a play.

ISA will celebrate Europe day on Thursday. The day's events will in-

clude videos, slide shows, Danish and Swedish presentations, German movies and a European folk dance ensemble performance.

Special events for World Forum Day Friday include videos, lectures on global issues and a panel discussion and the weekly *International Coffee Hour* in the EMU Fir Room.

As a whole, this year's International Festival promises to expose the campus and the community to the world and its many cultures.

"International Festival gives people a chance to learn from one another and to share affection and talent," Soerakoeseomah said.

Concluding International Festival is International Night 1990, to be held in the EMU Ballroom on Sunday April 8. More than 200 students have been working on International Night since last Fall term, Steele said.

Advance tickets for International Night are available at the EMU Main Desk at \$8 for general public and \$6 for students. Included in the menu for International Night is a 10 course buffet of foods from all parts of the world and an evening of cultural performances by international students and alumni.

"We go through each continent and we focus on the whole world," Steele explained. "If people want to become international and learn about other cultures, this week is the best week to do it."

Eugene galleries host 'Artwalk'

Art lovers will have the opportunity to take an evening stroll through eight Eugene art galleries and the University's Museum of Art during "Artwalk," a gallery tour benefit for the museum, from 4:30 to 9 p.m. on Friday April 6.

"Artwalk" might begin with the recently opened exhibition of Rodin sculptures at the Museum of Art, 1430 Johnson Lane, and continue to nearby galleries to take in exhibitions that feature a wide variety of contemporary local, regional and national works.

The University museum and each gallery will offer free wine tasting and refreshments. The galleries each will have prize drawing for a work of art, and several also will feature live music.

Participating galleries are Alder Gallery, Charles d'Lou Wildlife Gallery, Jacobs Gallery, Kerns Art Center, McDonald Frame Shop and Gallery, Opus 5 Gallery of Crafts, Soaring Wings Gallery and New Zone Gallery.

"Artwalk" tickets, \$5 each, are available in advance or at the door at the University Museum of Art and participating galleries.

The event is sponsored by the Friends of the Museum of Art. Members of the support group will be on hand at the museum and each gallery to greet guests and introduce the art work.

"You won't have to drive to Portland this month for the First Thursday gallery walk there; instead, you'll be able to discover Eugene's art scenery," said Jo Layne McDow of the Friends of the Museum. "In addition to raising money for the museum, this premiere 'Artwalk' is a way to liven up downtown at night and to bring more people into the galleries."

Gallery walks have become a popular tradition in Portland and Seattle where galleries and art museums stay open one night a month. The Friends of the Museum of Art plan to make Eugene's "Artwalk" an annual event.

Exhibitions at the museum include 27 bronze sculptures by Auguste Rodin, on loan from the Stanford University Museum of Art; "Artists at Oregon," featuring works from the museum's collection by 50 past and present faculty artists; and "Computers and the Creative Process," displaying works by 31 American artists, all generated with computers.

Participating galleries will each have individual exhibits that from sculptures by Mike Randles at the Kerns Art Center to wildlife oils by Kath Clay in the Charles d'Lou Wildlife Gallery.
