

# Ducks head north for first dual meet

The Oregon women's track team hopes to continue its domination of Washington this weekend in Seattle with a dual meet against the Huskies and Idaho, but it won't be easy.

The Ducks, who have performed well in two non-scoring meets thus far, have lost only once to the Huskies. The Ducks have won the last 12 in a row, including all six meetings at Husky Stadium.

The Huskies are returning some top performers from last year's Pacific-10 Conference season. Angie Tasker led her team in the triple jump last year finishing second in the conference to Oregon's Phillis McKinney.

The Huskies have three of the eight conference qualifiers in the shot put thus far in the young season headed by LaTonya Reed (45-5 1/4). Two of Reed's teammates, LaTonya White and Susanne Danderhault, have surpassed the 45-foot mark as well.

"On paper, Washington is looking really good," Oregon coach Tom Heinonen said. "They've got a lot of seniors and I think they realize this could be their opportunity to defeat Oregon."

The most notable improvement on the Washing-

ton squad is in the distances. Three runners have qualified for the Pac-10 3,000.

Jennifer Gillette has the fastest time of the three (9:44.0), followed by Jennifer Draughton (9:45.0) and Anne Howard (9:49.0).

Draughton placed fifth in the conference 5,000 last year and sixth in the 3,000. Michelle Buresh, third in last year's Pac-10 10,000, also returns.

The irony of this meet revolves around the distances.

Oregon, perennially a team dependent on its distance runners, is weaker in the distance area than it has been in the past.

The brightest hope in the distances is senior Liz Wilson, who posted the fastest 3,000 meter time (9:28.3) of the season in the Pac-10 last weekend at Berkeley. Wilson was an NCAA qualifier in the 1,500, 3,000 and 5,000 last year.

Freshman Lucy Nusrala looks to qualify for the Pac-10 1,500 after missing the mark by six-tenths of a second last weekend.

Kim Hyatt, the Ducks' all-American javelin thrower continues to surprise her coaches and competitors. Hyatt, who placed eighth in last year's NCAA meet, has already thrown over the 160-foot mark (165-4).

## Men's tennis continues win streak

It's five in a row for the Oregon men's tennis team after an easy 8-1 win over Willamette Thursday on the Ducks' home courts.

Oregon has won five straight matches, including a four-match winning streak on the recent road trip to South Carolina.

The Ducks swept all six singles matches, with all but one of the wins coming in straight sets. Oregon's third singles man, Ted Rubin, lost the first set to John Lovell, but came back to take the next two sets 6-2, 6-2.

Kevin Cory, the Ducks' top singles player, had no problem disposing of David Jerke, taking a 6-1, 6-2 win. James Hazard of Oregon also registered an easy win, stopping Kelley Tuttle 6-4, 6-1.

Robert Atkin, who moved from Oregon's fifth position to fourth because of an injury to Jon

Weinberg, raced past Swain Porter of Willamette by a 6-2, 6-2 score.

Christian Oelke moved to the fifth position and blew past Andrew Shipman 6-2, 6-2. Kevin Settlemyre, Oregon's replacement sixth man, made it 6-0 Oregon with a 6-3, 6-2 win over Adrian Chin.

With the win secured by the 6-0 sweep in singles play, Oregon coach Buzz Summers went to his bench for doubles play. Summers moved his No. 2 doubles team, Settlemyre and Atkin, to No. 1 and teamed Ted Thoren with Oelke for No. 2 doubles. He also gave freshman Kevin Govro and Doug Root the third doubles match.

Settlemyre and Atkin beat Jerke and Rick Wood in straight sets by a 6-4, 6-4 score. Oelke and Thoren accounted for the teams' only loss of day with a 1-6, 7-6, 7-5 loss to Tuttle and Shipman.

Root and Govro took a tough 5-7, 6-3, 7-3 win over Porter and Lovell to end the match.
