ently grew exponentially as the word of it spread," Maddlock said.

Maddlock said there were kegs present, but only residents of the two apartment complexes had access to them. The beer bottles were brought by other parties, Maddlock said.

Many students who attended this party said they reacted defiantly to seeing police in helmets and carrying batons.

"Just seeing them dressed like they were was enough to cause a reaction," said University student Tim Hazen. "It looked like the police were trying to show power."

Eugene police Capt. Dick Loveall disagrees with that assumption, saying officers wore safety gear as part of department policy.

"I don't wear a helmet to intimidate you, I wear it to protect my head," he said.

Many parties complained that police did not issue an audible warning to disperse the crowd of about 200 at the East 14th Avenue location.

University student Brett Morse, a member of a band that was playing at the party, said he didn't hear an order to disperse. Band members were between the police and the crowd, and Morse said he doubted if people in the back could even see the police.

"The problem is that if the people in the back didn't want to get out, no one could get out," Morse said.

Capt. Loveall said when officers ordered the site cleared, the crowd responded with chants and obscenities. Some bottles were thrown, and police warned people again before throwing tear gas.

About an hour later, police moved to 1433 Patterson St., where about 200 people had converged. Police twice warned parties over a patrol car loudspeaker that if they did not disperse, they would be arrested. As the officers moved closer, individuals threw bottles and firecrackers. Police threw more tear gas, scattering the crowd into the streets.

University officials will review police reports of the incident to determine if the student conduct code was violated, said Gerry Moseley, vice provost for academic support and student services.

Moseley said the event upset members of the administration. "The University and the ASUO have spent a great deal of time making an attempt" to curb this kind of behavior, he said.

The incident has prompted ASUO President

Andy Clark to consider reintroducing kegs into the Greek system. This is the second time in less than a year that police have used force to break up parties in the campus area where alcohol is present.

Last May five people were arrested as police broke up a similar riot at 14th Avenue and Ferry Street.

"What I see is a complete displacement of students," Clark said. "Where before, it (party activity) was in the fraternities Friday and Saturday nights."

"I'm not calling for an automatic reintroduction of kegs," but the issue should be examined, Clark said.

Saturday's riot occurred six days after the ASUO sent 1,600 letters to students in the 97401, 97405 and 97403 zip codes explaining how to throw safe parties.

"We need to find a real solution beyond letters and beyond a community task force," Clark said.

Moseley said the current ban on kegs in fraternities is not the problem. "The problem is that people want to drink to excess and misbe-

have."

He added that if there are any changes in the current alcohol policy, "I would consider being more strict."

One officer sustained minor injuries from a thrown bottle and four people were treated for eye irritation at Sacred Heart General Hospital.

Long after the crowds had left, police arrested two young men who were "instrumental in furthering the mob psychology that prevailed when officers responded and attempted to gain compliance without escalated use of force," police said.

Patrick Carter Weldon, 19, and Karl Joseph Pillar, 17, both of Ashland, were charged with felony rioting, according to a police press release. Pillar faces an additional charge of minor in possession by consumption.

Five officers wrestled Pillar to the ground as he resisted arrest.

In separate incidents, police broke up three parties Friday night in the 2000 block of Onyx street. Police cited three University students and five others for various offenses.

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
