Women look to get back on track

Oregon holds a similar streak against Washington State, having defeated the Cougars in all 11 of their previous meetings. The Ducks had no trouble with Boise State last year defeating the Broncos 99-37 in their first and only meeting.

Oregon coach Tom Heinonen has a streak of his own on the line. While under his leadership of 14 years, the Ducks have not dropped more than one dual meet in a season.

'We want to see improvements in this meet from last week," he said. "We need a greater ability to compete in the clutch.

The Cougars are strong in the 800 and 400. Senior Celestine N'Drin, the reigning Pacific 10 Conference 400 title holder, is expected to be the strong favorite in the 800 Saturday.

"Celestine is head and shoulders above the rest in the 800." Heinonen said.

Sophomore Jennifer Carpenter won the Pac-10 800 last year and will run the 400 for the Cougars Saturday. Heinonen believes Carpenter has to be the favorite in the 400 as well.

The key to the meet in Heinonen's eyes is the 4x100 relay, one of the earlier events on Saturday's schedule. The Ducks will receive stiff competition from Boise State in this event

Boise State may pose more

problems for both the Ducks and Cougars than just in the 4x100.

'I wouldn't overlook them in this meet. (Boise State) could possibly win the meet." Heinonen said "They're solid. They're way more than fillers.

Junior Christine Johnson of Keizer has cleared 5-101/2 indoors in the high jump with a best of 5-7 so far this year. Senior Stachia Neeley from Nassau. Bahamas will open her season in the 200 and 400 this year, while jumping a seasonbest 18-91/4 in the long jump.


Neeley owns personal bests of 25.14 in the 200 and 55.78 in the 400, while boasting a 20-4% lifetime mark in the long jump.

Sprinting is the Bronco's strong suit with junior Kris Jessen (11.95) and sophomore Carla Boyde (11.93) leading the team in the 100. Jessen has recorded a 12.41 this year, while Boyde has turned in a 12.58.

Heinonen would like to see improvement from Laurie Williams in the 100 and 200 Saturday after a below-average showing last week in the 400.

Oregon's other Williams Rosie - has been on fire so far in this young season. She possesses the second fastest time among Pac-10 sprinters in two events clocking an 11.86 in the 100 and a 24.15 in the 200. Both marks qualify her for the Pac-10 meet.

Sophomore Kim Hyatt and junior Paula Berry have been impressive in the javelin. Both have qualified for the Pac-10 meet



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
