Commission approves protocol

Student group opposes use of macaques

And the macaque monkey controversy rages on.

The recent decision of the Institutional Animal Care and Use commission to approve the protocol of Dr. Richard Marrocco, which involves the use of macaque monkeys, has left some people crying foul.

Under federal law the IACUC must review and approve all animal research that is scheduled to take place at the Uni-

According to the protocol. the monkeys will be used in neurological research dealing with the brain's systems for selecting and concentrating upon information.

The controversy originates from the use of the monkeys for research purposes and whether the IACLIC violated Oregon's public meetings law when approving the protocol.
