in the Pac-10, five games behind UCLA. Oregon also finished in a tie for fifth in the NCAA Women's College World Series in Sunnyvale, Calif.

With eight starters and 12 letter winners returning from the 1989 team, hopes were high for even better things in the 1990 season. But the Ducks' 21-17 record is a full nine games behind the pace they set after 38 games last season when they were 30-8.

Although the team hasn't fared as well this season as had been hoped, Brown said the Ducks will show they are a quality team with another postseason appearance.

"We won't use our schedule as an excuse," she said. "We're going to keep improving and we're going to be there in the end."

Brown, who took over coaching duties this season after Teresa Wilson guided the team to its first-ever post-season appearance in 1989, said the team has taken some time to adjust to a new leader.

"I think that affected our play at first," Brown said. "They didn't know what to expect from me on our first road trip. Now they're starting to relax a little more."

As expected, sophomore pitcher Katie Wiese has been the Oregon pitching staff's workhorse. In a conference-leading 30 appearances, Wiese has a 15-8 record and a 1.08 ERA.

Wiese's 15 wins leads the Pac-10, and her 19 com-

plete games is second best in the conference. She also leads in innings pitched with 180 2/3.

Although Wiese has all but carried the pitching burden of the Ducks this season, Brown said she is not concerned about burnout in her star pitcher.

"Softball pitchers can pitch four or five games a day and not have it hurt them," Brown said. "I'm not concerned about that. We have to go with our best and Katie's the one."

With Wiese her usual dominating self, Brown said the team has been betrayed at times this season by its defense. The Ducks average almost two errors a game.

"We've lost some games this season because of our defense," Brown said. "We just need more concentration and consistency in the field."

Oregon has been led on offense this season by Julie Cavanaugh, who has been moved from catcher to first base because of a dislocated finger on her throwing hand.

Cavanaugh, a junior from Salem, leads Oregon and the Pac-10 in batting with a .387 mark and is tied for second in the conference with 48 hits and third in runs scored with 23.

During the Ducks' most recent road trip, the team's average tumbled 43 points from .270 to .227. During that trip, only outfielder Jeanna King and designated player Kim Manning improved their batting averages. King went from .192 to .202 and Manning

went from .137 to .170.

Arizona, 31-8 on the season and tied for first in the conference at 5-1, is led on offense by the .364 average, 36 runs and 24 stolen bases of outfielder Vivian Holm. Nicki Dennis, who plays third base on defense, hits .316 with 13 RBI for Arizona, which has won 17 of its last 20.

Julie Jones leads the Wildcat pitching staff with a 13-2 record. When not pitching, Jones plays first base and leads the team with 18 RBI on a .286 batting average.

Arizona has won all three of its games with the Ducks this season, sweeping a double header Feb. 13 and taking a 2-1 win in the Arizona Softball Classic later that month.

"They're an excellent team," Brown said. "They're very quick and very well coached. They can drag and they can hit for power."

Duck notes-Sophomore pitcher Jan Larson was dismissed from the team because of violations of University academic regulations. Larson appeared in 30 games in 1989 and had a 1.90 ERA with an NCAA-leading six saves. In eight games this season, Larson was 2-3 with a 2.30 ERA and one save.

Saturday's double header at Howe Field starts at 1 p.m. Admission is \$3 for adults, \$2 for children and senior citizens. University students and children five and younger are admitted free.
