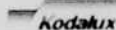

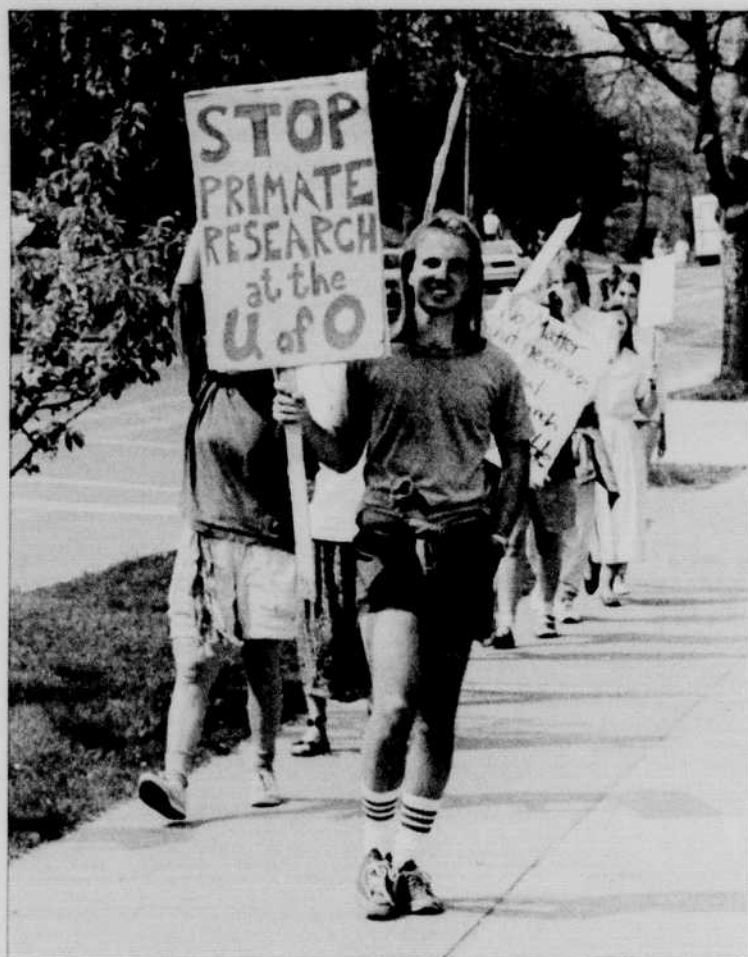

Animals Continued from Page 1

Dunlap said people are scared to abandon animal research in favor of available alternatives because science has relied animals for so long.

"Genetic and computer technology is much more capable of creating human aspects," she said. "Death is not necessary any longer."

The University is seeking animal research dollars because of

its new emphasis on the sciences, she said.

Such grants are easily available because of the large number of organizations that make money from raising and distributing animals, Dunlap said.

Members of the Coalition for Animals and Animal Research stood across the street from the protesters, passing out pamphlets to the media and passers-by.

"We're here largely in response to this and to disseminate information we have regarding animal research," said Monte Matthews, CFAAR member. "We want to put into perspective the many misconceptions animal rights people have."

Matthews said alternatives to animal research are being developed but that these breakthroughs are not sufficient to replace animals completely.

Scientists should conduct animal research based on moral decisions, he said. If an individual will benefit from the research's possible outcomes, then the research should be conducted.

"We're trying to say 'yes we're currently trying to develop alternatives, but you can only program computers with what we learned from animal research,'" Matthews said.

ACHING FOR LOVE is the first book to explore fully the problems of sexuality and intimacy faced by adult children of alcoholics—straight or gay.

"If you're an adult child of an alcoholic, chances are you're unhappy with your sex, with your life, with your relationship partner, and/or with yourself," write the authors. Based on research with over 100 women who grew up in alcoholic families, *Aching for Love* focuses on the sexual problems that often face adult children.

Mary Ann Klausner, an expert in sexuality and substance abuse, lives in Eugene, OR. She is an adjunct faculty member at the California Family Study Center in Burbank, CA. Bobbie Hasselbring, who lives in Beavercreek, OR, is the author of *The Medical Self-Care Book Of Women's Health* and other books. She writes for *MS*, *Women's Sports* and *Fitness*.
