



Arizona was led by the play of sophomore Danielle Scott, who beat Oregon's top singles player, Kumi Nagamoto in the closest match of the day, 6-3, 6-3.


All nine of the matches were straight-sets wins for Arizona and, other than Nagamoto, none of the Ducks was able to win more than three sets in a match.

Kim Grace of Arizona finished singles play, beating Jackie Deford 6-0, 6-0 in the sixth singles play.
