company has lost more than \$10 million over the last two years, and Morgan stock has plummeted from a pre-strike level of \$30 a share to \$8 or \$9 in recent months.

Sue Grabowski, a representative from Nicolai, said the company took losses in early 1988 and 1989, but said. "We're past that now. The \$10 million loss figure the union is using is not accurate.

However, Robinson said, rumors abound that Morgan is going broke and will have to sell the plant

Striking workers are tired and unsure about the future.

"I don't think it will end unless we quit striking or Morgan goes broke." said Jerry Buessow, a striking Nicolai worker

The last meeting between union representatives and Morgan management was in November, 1989, and Grabowski said no further talks have been scheduled.

Striking workers have had some allies in their struggle. The community has responded to Morgan's actions by forming the Eugene Springfield Solidarity Network to support the striking workers and to work to protect the community from suffering the effects of leveraged buyouts by out-of-state

4-1-1 in favor of the allocation, with IFC member Chad Bennion voting against it and Revill abstaining

Bennion said he was not convinced an increase would be the best way, given the University enrollment cap and an expected tuition hike

But USSA, a national student lobbying organization. fights for student rights at the state and federal level, said Morales, who is USSA vice-chair of the Northwest Pacific region.

ASUO Executive received a \$158,328 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, a 3.1 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$153,790. The increase derived from higher union labor costs in the ASUO Executive.

The committee voted 2-1-2 in favor of the allocation, with Nhem voting against it and Bennion and Revill abstaining.

The allocation was less than requested by the ASUO Executive

The Office of Student Advocacy received a \$46,596 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, a 2.8 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$45.310. The committee unanimously approved the allocation.

The allocation was not large enough to provide the office for the secretarial help it needed to work effectively. Director Marlene Drescher said

Survival Center received a \$14,133 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, a 1.15 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$13.978. The committee voted 3-2 in favor of the allocation, with Bennion and Nhem voting against it.

YMCA Big Brother Big Sister program received a \$1,206 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, a 7.3 percent increase from last year's allocation of \$1.124. The committee unanimously approved the allocation.

Black Student Union received a \$11,454 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, unchanged from last year's allocation. The committee voted unanimously in favor of the allocation.

Oregon Daily Emerald received a \$124.871 allocation for the 1990-91 budget season, unchanged from last year's allocation. The committee voted unanimously in favor of the allocation
