

Police Beat

The following is a list of campus area crimes taken from Office of Public Safety and Eugene Police Department reports between Mar. 25 and April 7:

• EPD received a report of a \$150 car stereo stolen from 15th Avenue and Alder Street on Apr. 7.

• Between 15 and 20 sweatshirts from the MEChA office at EMU were reported stolen to EPD on Apr. 6. The MEChA logo is printed on the sweatshirts, which are green, white and red, black or white, and valued at \$200.

• A bicycle tire, tire rim and pedals were reported stolen from Hamilton Complex to EPD on Apr. 6. The parts, removed from a bike parked at a bike rack, had a \$50 value.

• A \$50 front wheel from a mountain bike at Pi Beta Phi sorority was also reported stolen to EPD on Apr. 6.

• A \$45 student parking permit removed from a car at 1295 Franklin Blvd. was reported stolen to EPD on Apr. 6.

• A University student's \$400 leather jacket was reported stolen from Condon Hall to OPS on Apr. 4. The student left the jacket in the building and returned several hours later to find it gone.

• An EPD officer gave a University student a traffic citation for failing to drive right, and cited the student for interfering with and giving false information to a police officer, on Apr. 3.

The officer stopped the student, who was heading westbound in an eastbound bike lane in heavy foot and vehicle traffic.

The officer asked the student for 1.D. The student said he didn't have any, and gave a false name.

The officer checked with OPS to confirm the subject's status as a student. At this time the student got on his bike and fled the area.

The officer pursed the student on foot, caught up and removed the student from his bike. The student then gave his actual name when he was handcuffed.

At this time a crowd of about 30-35 people formed around the officer.

• A wallet was reported stolen from a MacArthur Court men's restroom to OPS on Mar. 29. The wallet, stolen during Spring Term registration, was later recovered, with \$108 missing.


• A lamp and a piece of a sectional couch was reported stolen from Hamilton Complex to OPS on Mar. 29. The total value of the items is \$222.

• A burglary at Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity during spring break was reported to EPD on Mar. 25. A TV set. radio. remote-control car and about 40 cassette tapes, totaling \$960. were taken by the unknown suspect, who left no signs of forced entry.
