Henderson has budget experience

Seeks streamlined process

Edward Henderson, a candidate for a one-year seat on the Incidental Fee Committee, would like to streamline the IFC budgeting process and help student groups find outside sources of funding.

Henderson, a senior majoring in sociology, has eight and a half years of budgeting and ac-



counting experience from the Army and from working at the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Ore.

Henderson served as a finance specialist for the Army reserves in Vancouver. Wash before going on active duty and working as a finance specialist and accountant at Ft. Bragg. N.C.

Last summer while working at the Confederated Tribes. Henderson helped assemble an \$18 million budget. Henderson said the budget included all aspects of the community including social programs, financing, public safety and payroll.

"I did all the number crunching." Henderson said.

He transferred to the University this year after attending Campbell University in North Carolina and has been working at a local CPA firm in Eugene.

If elected to the IFC. Henderson said he would like to help student groups keep the quality of their programs by cutting funds as little as possible. He said there should not be a "spend it or lose it" philosophy to budgeting in the IFC.

"Budgeting is a tool, but it should not necessarily be used to penalize a group," Henderson said.

Student groups should show a need for the money. Henderson said adding that he would look at an organization's past record of activity on campus.

"if (the student groups) are helping diversify the campus as a whole, then they should get the money," he said.

Federal or state grants may be available to help student groups fund their programs. Henderson said, adding that there are agencies that would be willing to match funds or offer grants to student groups.

By using this federal or state

funding. Henderson said the budgeting process would be diversified and there would be more money to offer to groups.

"Right now, it's just sliding between their fingers," he said

Henderson said his status as a transfer student would help him look at the campus issues from a neutral standpoint.

Although he admits he has not been actively involved with campus politics. Henderson said he would like to learn more about the issues through a possible position on the IFC.

"I'm not really a political kind of guy, but I'm a worker." he said. "To me. IFC isn't just about allocating money, it's also about finding money to diversify the funding."

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
