

Baily plans to lobby Legislature

Better funding for higher education and child care and an executive office staff representing all students are the priorities for ASUO candidates Kirk Bailey and Sheila Stickel.

The 1991 legislative year will be high on the priority list in the ASUO executive office, said Stickel, ASUO publicity coordinator.

She and Bailey, ASUO University affairs coordinator, plan to work closely with student lobbyists for improved state funding for higher education, faculty salaries, support for graduate teaching fellows as well as faculty recruiting and retention, Stickel said.

The two candidates also plan to include as much of the student body as possible to stage a visible campaign for student issues while the Legislature is in session.

"We're already thinking about letters, phone calls and rallies," Stickel said. "We'd also like to send van-loads of students up to Salem."

Bailey and Stickel plan to work with the United States Student Association on higher education funding issues, they said.

Moreover, the two candidates pledged to include students representing many different

points of view and organizations on their executive staff.

Bailey and Stickel said they have met with various student groups in the last week, including Black Student Union, Gay and Lesbian Alliance and MEChA.

They said they plan to include representatives from those groups and others on their hiring committee before they select an executive staff.

Bailey and Stickel will also maintain relationships with student groups next year.

"We will be doing things like going to meetings and having more casual contact with student organizations," Bailey said. "We'd like to do things like have a dinner a week with the different groups."

The two candidates have also taken positions on the following issues:

Student Health Insurance: Bailey and Stickel said they oppose mandatory health insurance. "Students should have the option to choose their own student health insurance," Bailey said.

Revenue sharing: "We're opposed to it," Bailey said. "It's probably going to be the last straw for a lot of people."

Campus safety: Bailey, a

member of the campus lighting committee, said his office will oversee the implementation of the last phases of the lighting plan.

Bailey, a political science major, said he would also like to see the role of the Student Response Team expanded to include an escort service for women walking on or near campus after dark. The SRT is a team of students who currently monitor weekend parties in the University area.

"It's been shown that most sexual assaults in this area take place on the periphery of campus, not on the campus itself," said Bailey, who works on the Unwanted Sexual Attention Task Force. "Most people live one or two blocks off campus" and could benefit from an additional service to Saferide vans, he said.

Both Bailey and Stickel have backgrounds in student government. Besides their current ASUO positions, Bailey has been involved in the Pre-law Society, University Housing and the Constitution Court.

Stickel, a journalism major, held several positions in University Housing, including resident assistant and a seat on the housing area standards board.

Final debate slated tonight

The second and final ASUO presidential debate of this year's campaign will be held tonight at 7:30 in Room 150 Columbia.

The format of today's debate, sponsored by the ASUO elections board, will be different from last week's. After a two-minute opening statement from candidates Steve Maples/Diane Cushman and Kirk Bailey/Sheila Stickel, each ticket will have the opportunity to grill the other on two issues.

After response and rebuttal, candidates will take questions from the audience before making three-minute closing statements.

Voting in primary elections will take place Thursday and Friday. Students will select candidates for ASUO president and vice president, Incidental Fee Committee, Student Senate, EMU Board, and President's Advisory Council.

Students will vote on ballot measures and decide any run-off races during next week's general elections, April 26 and 27.

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
