

New back nine opens Thursday

A pair of Oregon coaches will join today's celebrity open at Riverside Golf Course and Driving Range to mark the opening of the course's new back nine.

Football coach Rich Brooks and basketball coach Don Monson will participate in the "18 Open" Open Celebrity Exhibition along with PGA Tour pro Peter Jacobsen, his brother David and course designer Ric Jeffries. Tee time will be 11:30 a.m., with the public admitted free.

The golf course will open the 18-hole course to the public on Thursday.

The completion of the back nine is the second phase in the building of the Riverside course. The first nine holes were completed in 1988 and construction began shortly thereafter on the final nine

holes. Construction was completed and the grass was planted for the back nine in 1989.

Riverside is open to the public and charges a \$10 greens fee for nine holes and \$17 for 18 holes. With the completion of the course, Jeffries described it as "an upscale daily course."

"The condition of the course is a lot better than most daily courses," he said. "A lot of that has to do with the work of the crew and some of the features that are unique to daily golf."

Jeffries said that most of the "uniqueness" to the course relates to the construction of the course and the drainage system installed.

But the most attention has been on today's celebrity open that came about because of Jacobsen, Jeffries said.

"It came about from a gracious offer from Peter when he was here for a football game last year," he said. "He told us

that once the course was complete he'd love to come down and do it.

"We looked around at dates and matched his schedule," Jeffries said.

With the course being off the Delta-Belt Line highway in Eugene, Jeffries said it made sense to include Brooks and Monson. The event was helped out by Jacobsen's brother David — a former Oregon golfer — who owns a turf company in Portland.

"I think it's going to be another fun day," Jeffries said of the celebrity event. "It's a great way to kick it off."

Jeffries also said he thinks the completion of the Riverside course serves an important purpose to the community.

"The Eugene-Springfield community is full of recreational sports and golf is now becoming a part of that," he said. "I think Fiddler's and Oakway have done a great job, but they're just a small part of the golf niche."

Freshman Ted Thoren finished singles play for the Ducks, taking care of Kravel in straight sets, 7-5, 6-3. Knauss beat Jon Weinberg 6-2, 1-6, 6-3 to take Portland's only win.



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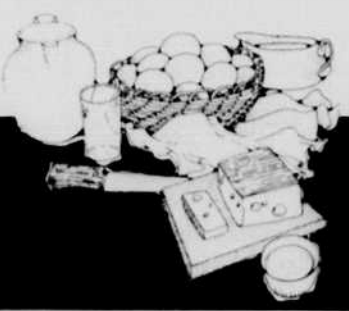
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
