

"I want to get the people to vote who voted for me before, and hopefully people who didn't vote for me — or didn't vote at all — to vote," he said.

Green said he planned to put out more fliers to "make sure people do vote" this week.

"Some people may think it's not a big deal to vote anymore," Green said. "Campaigning and publicity is very important this week."

"I need to get out and talk to people," Colson said. "I want to heighten awareness of lots of people to get out and vote. I wish there was more time to talk to more people."

"I plan to talk to more student groups and put the word out about the principles I stand for," Hughes said. "There are a lot of people who support me, and I think it'll help a lot that OSPIRG and child care are on the ballot with me, because

those are important measures."

"I sincerely hope Vilches and I are going to win. I'm tired of special interests dominating IFC in the last year," Hughes said. "I gave up about a year ago about guessing what the student body is going to vote."

Vilches said he hadn't expected to lead the primaries with the most votes. "I'm happy people believe in me and think I can do a good job," he

said. "But if I win or not remains to be seen until the campaign next week."

Colson, who received the second largest number of votes, said he was pleased with the outcome. "I thought I ran a good race so far," he said, adding he would like to see "new blood" among the IFC candidates.

Kari Anderson, Jennifer Bills, Barclay Lloyd Grayson and JoSonja Watson are the win-

ning candidates for one-year IFC seats.

Anderson led the race for one-year seats with more than 1,400 votes.

"It was a great outcome," said Anderson. "I felt I was one of the most qualified, and I feel very confident about working with the others."

Anderson said she will be happy to work with Grayson because of his background in accounting and working with the greek system.

Grayson, currently Interfraternity Council treasurer, said he encouraged any student groups with budget problems to contact him now.

"I'm extremely excited about this future position and I'm sincerely looking forward to working with all the different organizations on campus to improve their efficiency and effectiveness," Grayson said.

Watson said she was surprised by the vote count, which let her claim the fourth one-year seat by only 15 votes.

"I didn't think I was going to win because I'm a freshman," she said. "But 839 people voted for me."

Watson said she has never met any of the other winning IFC candidates, "but from reading their stories and whatnot in the paper I think they're very qualified," she said.

Bills couldn't be reached for comment.

While running for the IFC one-year seat, Bills said she was committed to keeping student fees low and maintaining the quality of programs at the University. Her goals included taking a closer look at the Athletic Department's budget and improving communication with student groups.

An estimated 2,995 students voted in the primary elections.

Two student groups, Youth Greens and Survival Center, had filled the car with garbage, plastics, dirt and plants on Monday in honor of Earth Week. The two groups also held a rally where an American flag and an effigy of President George Bush were burned.

Linda Beck, a Eugene police officer on campus detail, said witnesses reported a loud boom and saw the car catch on fire.

"The car was doused in gasoline," Beck said. Police found one empty gasoline can.

Eugene firefighters were called to put out the fire. Students repainted the car and replanted the flowers the next day.


According to police reports, witnesses saw four college-age suspects running, first behind Friendly Hall, then west on 13th Avenue.

Eugene police Capt. Tim Birr declined to comment on a motive in the case, but said the three men were arrested after an anonymous tip, interviews with suspects and identification by witnesses.

Eugene police subsequently charged the three after the interviews.

The fourth suspect lives in California and is Jones' friend. He has been contacted there by phone, Birr said. It's uncertain whether a warrant will be issued for his arrest, he said.
