

Athletics gets \$1.2 million

The Incidental Fee Committee approved a \$1.2 million budget for the Athletic Department Monday, the same amount allocated last year.

IFC Notes

The request for \$1,189,000 was passed by a five-vote majority, with Steve Maples abstaining.

Although the cost of maintaining the University's athletic department is increasing, no increase in IFC would be needed, said Sandy Walton, assistant athletic director.

Revenue gained from broadcasts of sporting events, aid from the Pacific-10 conference and concessions revenue from two additional home football games next fall will help the athletic department with its increased expenses, Walton said.

The Independence Bowl game in December improved attendance and interest in Uni-

versity sporting events, she said.

Walton said there will be seven home football games next fall, opposed to five last season, which will also bring in money for the athletic department.

Also on the agenda, a motion to reconsider the ASUO child care budget and discuss it at a later meeting was passed unanimously.

The IFC approved a \$100,000 budget for the child care center earlier this year. The committee wants to re-examine the program's other possible sources of funding.

The IFC will meet tonight at 6:30 in the EMU Board Room to hear appeals from the ASUO Child Care, YWCA, Woman's Center, Women in Transition, Recreation Intramurals, Pocket Playhouse, Student Book Exchange and the Minority Law Student Association.

The committee recommends that new IFC members attend today's meeting.
